

- (v) DEMONSTRATIVE, pointing out, as
this, that, these, those, and such.
Ex.—I will have none of *such*.

- (vi) DISTRIBUTIVE, denoting that things are distributed or
taken separately, as
each, every, either, neither.

Ex.—How happy could I be with *either*!

- (vii) INDEFINITE, not denoting precisely the object for
which it stands, as
one, any, aught, some, other, certain.

Ex.—I have eaten *none* of your corn.
As *certain* also of your own poets have said.
Gallio cared for *none* of these things.
It may be so for *aught* I care.

- (viii) REFLEXIVE, used as objects to verbs when subject
and object denote the same person, as
myself, himself, etc.

Ex.—He hurt *himself*.

- (ix) INTERROGATIVE, asking a question, as
what? which? whose?

Ex.—*What* does it matter?
What is it thou hast seen?

What.

† *Note.*—"WHAT" is really the neuter form of "who":

"I hear what you say."
="I hear [that] what you say."

and the Demonstrative Pronoun [that] is antecedent to the
Relative what.

Thus in

"Dora stored what little she could save,"

parse "what" as Relative Pronoun, accusative case, governed
by "save;" antecedent "that" (Demonstrative Pronoun)
understood.

[How would you parse "little?"]
