A jerky, irregular stroke is to be avoided. The long, strong, glide, with balance well held, proves more advantageous. Besides, when strokes are short and jerky the racer fails to derive the full benefit from the power expended.

Be content with gradual progress and skate as much as possible in the open air. Rink or indoor skating is naturally of much value, as it is available when the lakes, ponds or rivers are not frozen or cleared of heavy falls of snow. Do not patronize rinks, however, when outdoor ice is at hand. Skating in the open has an exhibitation and adds an incentive to speedy work that is lacking under cover. ing under cover.
