

Handling the Strawberry Bed

J. E. Smith. B.S.A. Many of us are persuaded that soon as we have taken the last pick-ing of strawberries we have nothing more to do with the bed until the coming season. This largely explains the smallness of the second crop of strawberries, and the big crop of bluegrass that we secure instead.

The strawberry bed requires more care after the crop has been taken care after the crop has been taken off, than before, if the vield for the next year is to be at all worth while.
