ENEMY RENEWS THE ATTACK ON YPRES

Germany Retreat South of Dixmude but Fiercely Attack Ypres; German Naval Squadron at Bay

Paris, December 1.—Regarding the Russian check to the Germans in their attempt to pierce the Russian centre, east of Lodz, the eastern war correspondent of the Journal in a despatch received from the Russian General Headquarters, says:—

THE RUSSIANS ARE GIVING PRAISE TO THE GRAND FIGHT WHICH THE GERMANS ARE GIVING THEM IN THEIR EFFORTS TO ESCAPE, BUT UNOFFICIAL PETROGRAD DESPATCHES DECLARE THAT IF THE GERMANS GET COMPLETELY FREE OF THE TRAP, IT WILL ONLY BE AT ENORMOUS LOSSES.
