THE WESTERN CANADA CROPS.

The following is an extract from a letter which has been received from the managers in Winnipeg of the Western Canada Investment Company, Limited:—
"Our Mr. Black has just returned from an inspection trip in the country, and we are glad to report that the crop situation is turning out better than was anticipated some time ago. We might summarise the condition of the crop in the various districts as follows: Manitoba and Northern Saskatchewan, very fair; Southern Saskatchewan, not quite so good; Southern Alberta, quite good; and Northern Alberta, fair. All told, the West should harvest about 225,000,000 bushels of wheat and from 125,000,000 to 145,000,000 bushels of oats, 'or about half crop of oats. It is difficult to estimate the barley crop, but it should be in the neighbourhood of 25,000,000 bushels. Flax should run about 45,000,000 bushels at least. The grain is of fine quality, and much of it of a high grade. Even if the farmers should have only from 8 to 10 bushels to the acre they will do very well, as they will probably get a price of about \$2 per bushel at their nearest shipping point."

THE WILLIAM DAVIES COMPANY.

General Manager Fox, of the William Davies Company, is to be indicted for failing to supply certain information regarding the company's business in connection with the cost of living investigations (says the *Daily Record*).

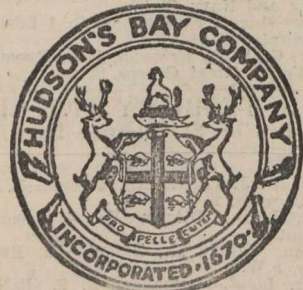
