The Minutes of yesterday were read.

Report of Delegate to Her Majesty's Government on the affairs of the Colony. The Honorable Mr. CROWDY, the Delegate from the Council appointed during the last Session of the Legislature, to proceed to England on the affairs of the Colony, laid before the House the following Report.

Immediately on my arrival in London, I addressed a Letter to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, of which the following is a copy:—
