INSPECTION OF THE TEETH OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

A meeting was held at the Dr. Adams Dental Institute in Toronto the other night to discuss the public school dental problem. The principal of one of the public schools presided and a number of leading dentists were present. The unanimous opinion of those present was that the teeth of children should be regularly examined in school. Dr. J. B. Willmott showed that owing to the neglect of children's teeth they became chronic dyspeptics in after life and in thousands of cases early mortality was the direct result of dental neglect in childhood. Dr. Willmott described harrowing cases in his experience where frightful ulcerations and disease had been consequent upon neglected teeth. He said that a very sad feature which came before the medical men at the Hospital for Sick Children was the terrible suffering of children, particularly girls, whose pain from other illness was aggravated by excruciating toothache, for the relief of which in their debilitated condition it was unsafe to resort to extraction. All this suffering might have been avoided if the teeth of the children had been regularly examined and cared for at school.

At a largely attended meeting in Kingsville a motion was passed binding those present not to sell their White Burley tobacco for less than 12 cents and to hold cigar leaf at 18 cents at least. Meetings will be held throughout the county, and every effort made to get all the growers to consent to this agreement.

The weakness of the Hardy outfit has been somewhat overestimated. With actual dissolution in sight, the government yesterday made a superhuman effort—and caught its breath again. It was a terrible wrench, however. With the united resources of two governments centered at the same time in a single constituency, it would have been surprising indeed if Mr. Hardy didn't carry the day. The Dominion government was almost as much concerned in the result of yesterday's election as was the Ontario cabinet. Sir Wilfrid Laurier dread making an appeal to the country while a Conservative government was in possession of Ontario. He could no more afford to lose South Ontario than Mr. Hardy could. A defeat yesterday, meant actual destruction for the one and the probable defeat of the other at the next general election. It would have been a kindly act if destiny had decided to cut Mr. Hardy loose from his troubles yesterday. A worse fate, however, appears to be in store for him. He has lately passed through a season of mental anguish, such as few politicians have experienced. And he still has to pilot the old bulk through the murky sea. It is just possible the Hardy government may retain its grip on the treasury benches until the two parties engage in a general and equal contest. A general election in Ontario is a possibility at the time. Such a contest means the dissipation of the Government's forces and their certain defeat.

HE TALKS SENSE.

Hon. Mr. Foster on the Prohibition Question.

He Thinks the Temperance People
Were Only Allowed to Fire
Blank Ammunition.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—George E. Foster, ex-Minister of Finance, who is a strong prohibitionist, in an interview published in the Witness, strongly criticises the Government for its action in the prohibition question. In reply to the question whether, with a clear majority given by seven provinces, any Government would be justified in permitting an adverse vote in a single province to prevent the will of the seven provinces being carried out, Mr. Foster said:—"Well, in order to do so, the constitution of the country would have to be radically altered. There would be one of two alternatives: either the Government must claim to regard the majority as insufficient, or it must take the position that the attitude of one province shall prevent legislation for the whole country—a position which, of course, from the constitutional point of view, is quite untenable."

"If you were a Minister of the Crown, Mr. Foster, would you feel justified in introducing a prohibitory law in view of the vote just polled?"
"That would depend upon the antecedent circumstances. It would depend upon the conditions laid down by the vote taken. In this case there were no conditions. I fully understand that it is idle to pass a prohibitory measure unless you have a preponderating public opinion in its favour. The question is a grave one. I should have thought out conditions which the vote should reach, and the realization of which would have justified a prohibitory measure."
