### Raise Salaries.

Hon, L. P. Pelletier introduced his resolution providing for increase of salary to clerks in city post offices, and the bill for carrying out the increase was given first reading. The bill raises the minimum salary from \$500 to \$600, and provides that increase may be granted of \$100 a year up to a maximum of \$1,400.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux urged the extension of competitive examinations to the outside service. He said that there were cases in which that system would not be applicable, but thought the various offices should be classified. He was heartily in favor


