Nuptial Notes

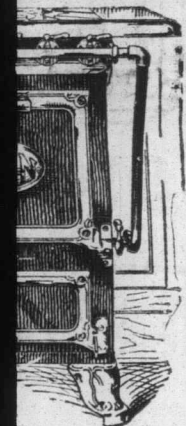
Cook—Gray.

AUSTRIANS FLEE FROM FIERCE RUSSIAN ADVANCE



MAP SHOWING PRINCIPAL POINTS OF RUSSIAN ADVANCE

The Austrians have evacuated Czernowitz, capital of Bukovina, according to despatches to Petrograd from Bukovina by way of Bucharest. The Russian advance along the whole southwestern front continues to develop with a degree of swiftness which has astonished the country. The success of the movement thus far is looked upon as the more remarkable in view of the strong defences which had been erected by the Austrians during the long period of preparation and their supposed readiness for resistance to any manner of assault.

FIVE KILLED; MANY INJURED

Explosion Yesterday Morning in Powder Works at Nobel, Parry Sound.

Parry Sound, June 22.—Five men are dead, a number seriously injured and others are suffering minor injuries as a result of an explosion yesterday morning in No. 3 charge house on the shrapnel side of the works of the Canadian Explosives, Limited, at Nobel, seven miles from this town. Seventy men were in the building, which was almost totally destroyed. It is believed that all have now been accounted for, though this cannot be absolutely established until the debris has been cleared away.

Constantinople a Hungry Place

New York, June 21.—Sixteen Americans, who said they had left Constantinople because of a scarcity of food supplies and because also the native population had evinced strong antipathy for all English-speaking persons, arrived here to-day as passengers on the Danish steamship Oscar II from Scandinavian ports. Among them were Professor Henry B. Dewing, connected with Roberts College, an American institution in Turkey; and Professor Maurice Tanguary, a zoologist, who was with the McMillan Crocker Land Expedition.

JAPAN AFTER A MAJORITY

**Not Only Helping Russia,
But is Getting Trade.**

New York, June 22.—Japan is not only proving to be a valuable ally of Russia in the war, but her business interests are reaching out and making every effort to get and control Russian trade that formerly went to Germany, according to P. A. Labrie, of Methuen, Mass., foreign representative of a manufacturer company who arrived here to-day on the steamship Oscar II from Copenhagen. Mr. Labrie has been in Russia for nearly a year in the interest of his company.

"I saw during my travels through Russia," said he, "numerous parties of Japanese business men who were doing all in their power to further their trade relations."

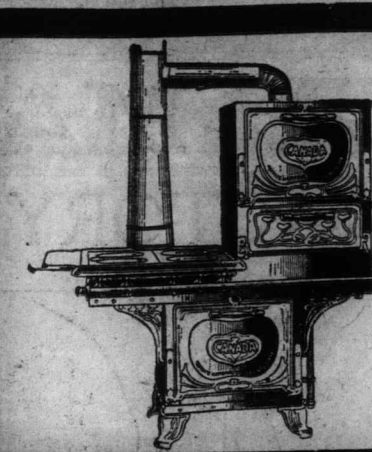

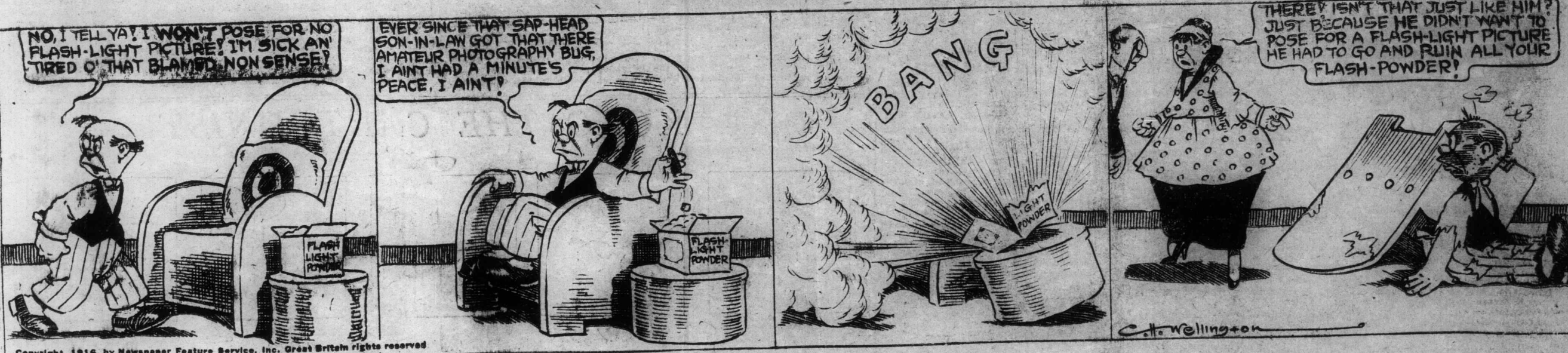
