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Recipes for Housekeepers

PRESEVING FRUIT WITHOUT SUGAR

The Recipe. The fruit is prepared in the ordinary way, the jars are cleaned and sealed while the rubbers and tops are boiling.

Peaches in Cantaloupes. Fill halves of cold cantaloupes with sliced peaches. Sprinkle them with sugar and candied ginger chopped fine, and serve with whipped cream.

Pickled Peaches. Pare large peaches but do not cut them, stick 3 cloves in each. Weight 7 lbs. of fruit to 3-4 lbs. of sugar.

Boiled Peach Pudding. Line a pudding basin with suet crust, fill with sliced peaches, and sprinkle each layer with brown sugar. Cover with crust, tie up in flouried cloth, and boil from 2 to 3 hours.

White Peach Salad. Take white peaches, firm, but ripe, and slice, sprinkling liberally with sugar, and the blanched meat of pecan nuts. Serve with cream.

Stone peaches, fill with cream. Prepare a dough as for biscuits, using a little butter in the shortening and an egg mixed with the milk, which is used in moistening.

(Continued from Page 1) mound that encloses the bodies of four soldiers, three French officers and one German officer. Kind hands have placed crosses, and decorated their graves with flowers.

No one who takes part in this afternoon service ought to remain untouched and unimpressed, for ways in such services, it is the living that are affected, since the dead are beyond our power. Eloquent appeals are made through the silent gray

On earth the thorns and the roses are blending. And a beauty immortal awaits from the tomb.

So as we thus honor the memory of the dead, we are reminded of the brevity of life, the certainty of death and the need of preparation for the life which is to come.

Then too it is a fitting sequence the ideals held by the I.O.O.F. their lifetime these departed were ministered to by the brothers of the order, the better so if those who thus ministered by the sick bed were seized of the thought of the Apostles James when he said: "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and the widows in their affliction and to keep themselves unspotted from the world."

And the history of the I.O.O.F. million of dollars have been distributed to the benefit of the suffering and bereaved. There is need to deep such fraternity and generosity, for it is likely that Bereavement will be generally be suffered by the relative members of the Order, since the members from Brantford and vicinity have to the number of one hundred and fifty enlisted for service overseas, some of whom will not return.
