WANTS MILITIA ACT ENFORCED

Lt.-Col. Williams Sees Way To Raise All the Men Needed.

Toronto, Dec. 15.—Lieut.-Col. G. H. Williams, camp chaplain and chief recruiting officer for this military division, offered a solution for all recruiting difficulties yesterday, which, in his estimation, would avoid conscription. The suggestion is that the Militia Act be put into effect, which would bring all of the country's available manhood into service for hourly training. This home training, he felt, would interest men in military affairs to such an extent that they would enlist for overseas service in sufficient numbers to keep the battalions at the front adequately supplied with reinforcements. This suggestion, it is understood, has been brought to the attention of the government by other military authorities. In the same connection Colonel Williams advocated government control of food supplies, in order to bring the public to a realization of the situation.

Under Secretary For Aviation

Decided on By French Cabinet—Other Under-Secretaries Appointed.

By Courier Leased Wire.

Paris, Dec. 15.—At the cabinet meeting last night President Poincaré signed decrees appointing the following under-secretaries: Medical services, Justin Godart; Public works transport and subsistence, Albert Clavelle; Mercantile marine, Louis Mail; Commerce, industry, agriculture and labor, M. Redon; Munitions, in charge of the section concerned with inventions for national defense, Jules Louis Breton; Munitions, in charge of manufacturing sections, Louis Loucheur; Fine Arts, Albert Delimier; Foreign office, in charge of blockade question Brant Denys Cochais.

The cabinet also decided on the creation of an under secretary for aviation, who will be appointed when Gen. Lyautey has taken over the war office.

A bill providing for an appropriation for these under secretaries will be introduced in the chamber of deputies to-day. The war office committee will hold its first meeting this morning.

PHOSPHATES IN RUSSIA FOUND

Progress Made By Russia In Agriculture Is Pointed Out.

Phosphates.
By Courier Leased Wire.
London, Dec. 15.—A Petrograd despatch to the Central News Agency says that a representative of the ministry of agriculture, addressing an agricultural congress, announced that during the current year 900 tractor engines had been bought abroad for Russia. Before the war such machines were scarcely known in the empire. The speaker said that in addition 90,000 rubles had been spent for harvesting machines, the demand for which was continually growing. He also declared that huge deposits of phosphate had been discovered which would meet the deficiency hitherto supplied by importations.

BANK OF ENGLAND STATEMENT.

London, Dec. 14.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve, decreased, \$36,000,000 pounds; circulation, increased, 99,000 pounds; bullion, decreased 836,806 pounds; other securities, decreased, 2,630,000 pounds; other deposits, decreased, 2,420,000 pounds; public deposits, decreased, 1,205,000 pounds; notes in reserve, decreased \$71,000 pounds. Government securities unchanged.

PROPERTY OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Will Not Mediate

Rome, Dec. 17, via Paris, Dec. 15.—Pope Benedict has no intention of attempting to mediate among the belligerents at present, according to a statement regarding the day by the Vatican. The statement says that neither the pope nor the Holy See have any wish to make any comment regarding Germany's peace proposals and that therefore any announcements attributed to them are utterly unfounded. It is added that Pope Benedict has an ardent desire for peace, but that he does not believe that any intervention at present moment would hasten conclusion.

The net result of several resolutions introduced in the chamber of deputies regarding the German offer, and a prolonged discussion among the senators and deputies, the decision by the legislators is no peace, unless it is accompanied by national actions and the rights of peoples on the principles of nationality. Such a peace is impossible to obtain diplomatically, it was declared; it must be obtained by victory arms.
