After two other witnesses had given unimportant evidence, Mr. Durian took the stand. He explained that the three tons of malt was purchased by the company's agent at Seattle and were shipped in Hertling's name by mistake; how They came to be marked "rolled barley" was beyond his knowledge. He did not know there was an internal revenue to be paid. on the malt in addition to the duty until his afrival at Dawson, when he found he had a consignment of 20 tons arriving via st. Michael to pay revenue on. After paying the bill it occurred to him that he should also pay on the three tons, and on Wednesday of requested Frank Kinghorn, in whose charge the stuff was stored, to go with him to the fustoms house and help him pay the revenue. Before they did so, however, a policeman hearned if the arrival of the three tons and arrested Mr. Burian Defendant disclaimed any intention of defrauding the government

Mr. Kinghorn confirmed the statement that Mr. Darian had asked him to go the customs onice with him for the purpose of paying the evenue.

This closed the case and after an argument by counsel for defendant, the court found Mr. Duriau guilty and fixed him \$50 and costs. SMUGGLED CIGARS.
