JAMES GORDON BENNETT

IS DEAD.

Proprietor of the New York Herald Passes Away in France—His Father, Who Founded the Paper, Was Once a School Teacher at Eastern Passage.

Beaulieu, France, May 14—James Gordon Bennett, proprietor of the New York Herald, died at five thirty o'clock this morning after having been unconscious for two days. Mr. Bennett's last words before lapsing into unconsciousness were in relation to his newspaper interests. Mrs. Bennett was with her husband when he died.

Despatches from France early this month reported Mr. Bennett so seriously ill that his condition was giving cause for anxiety.

BELAND WAS EXCHANGED FOR VON BUELOW

OTTAWA, May 14.—In view of Dr. Beland's arrival in Holland, the foreign telegram received by the prime minister thru the governor general from the colonial secretary on May 7th, may now be published. "German government has agreed to exchange Dr. Beland for Von Buelow, interned in England, and state that he will join next party transferred via Holland.
