 pleasing remarks. A duet by Mrs.
 Gallagher and Mrs. W. Stevens was
 well received. Rev. Mr. Roberts, of
 Montreal, made some humorous re-
 marks and, on invitation, gave a song
 in a rich baritone voice. Geo. Ten-
 nant, Esq., explained how he hap-
 pened to be present, and laid it all to his
 "red headed nephew." But from the
 way George enjoyed himself with the
 little black eyed "daisy" in the cor-
 ner, we opine he did not very much
 regret his being from home on such an
 unpleasant evening. A dialogue in




