London, Jan. 10.—The Daily Graphic makes the following statement regarding the seizures of German vessels by British warships:—"Germany has addressed two notes to the British Foreign Office, challenging Great British's right to detain any vessel travelling between two neutral ports. These notes have been duly answered. The Queen's Government find themselves wholly unable to acquiesce in Germany's contention. Germany cited a case in support of her contention, but on examination this so-called pre-cedent proved to be quite inapplicable to the seizure under discussion. The correspondence between the two Gov-ernments rests there, pending a deci-sion by the prize court."

ers' license by-law, which had been referred to the solicitor and found illegal from the fact that the board had no power to discriminate.


On motion the by-law in question was repealed and a new by-law passed by which the following words are added to clause 37a of by-law, No. 10:—
