Mr. Campbell said that a meeting of the citizens had been held yesterday in reference to a radial railway and that Mr. Rankin and himself had been nominated to address the county council.

The charter, granted on January 17th, 1898, providing that an electric railway should be built in this county in three years, had expired bin the 17th of January of this year. The assistance of the county pouncil was asked in petitioning the legislature to amend and extend the wharter for three years more. The meeting yesterday felt that if they secured the assistance of the county council in petitioning the legislature that the hands of the railway promoters would be strengthened. The proposed

would be strengthened. The proposed line was to touch Rondeau, Blenheim, Charing Cross, Wallaceburg, Oil Springs, Petrolea, Dover Centre, Mitchell's Bay and Pain Court.

Mr. Sturgis, asked why Dresden, the most important town in the county of Kent, had been side-tracked. Lieut-Col. Rankin then addressed the council. He said that Dresden was recognized as the hub tiff a part was recognized as the hub tiff a part of the county of Kent. The original charter didn't include Dresden, but the charter that it was now proposed to ask for covered Dresden. The Le-gislature had already been petitioned ed for a charter for Southern Kent and it was not the desire to antagonize or exhibit a spirit of hostility to the other road.
