International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—God Taking Care of Elijah—1. Kings, 17, 1-16.

Golden Text—"Casting all your care upon Him, for He careth for you."—1. Peter 5, 17.

Elijah comes in the magic lantern of our lessons, during the wicked reign of Ahab and Jezebel. He drops as from heaven into the midst of apostate Israel and her heathen priests, who are drinking in iniquity like water and sporting themselves in their shameless rites round their idol images. Gilead, Elijah's home-land, was to Southern Israel and Judah as the Highlands of Scotland to the Lowlands and England; the prophet's manner and appearance would similarly contrast with those to whom God sent him to make the announcement that there should be no dew nor rain for the next three years, unless he said so. Although Elijah stood before God, he is commanded by God, who sounds the retreat, to flee and hide himself from Ahab by the book Cherith, east of the Jordan. After making this bold declaration of war on Baal and idolatry, in which God will show Israel He is God and not Baal. Elijah has to retreat to learn lessons of patient humility, sitting down in the gorge by the brook God feeds him daily from the beak of a filthy raven (unclean according to the law), but from the angel hands just yet, but from the hands of a poor starving heathen widow woman of Zion, the wicked Jezebel's native land. Note the strong contrast in God's providential and gracious dealing with Elijah. Although in this great conflict "one shall chase a thousand and two put ten thousand to flight," and one man and God is a majority. We will always have to learn and know we are nothing, Christ is all in all. Friend, hast thou so learned and been taught of Him?

"Oh, to be nothing, nothing,  
Only to lie at His feet,  
A broken and empty vessel  
For the Master's use made meet."
