CADET CORPS

In his address before the Canadian Club, Toronto, on Thursday night, Earl Grey, the Governor-General, paid a tribute to the cadet corps of the country. He said:

"If every school in Canada gave the same drill which is already given by the best schools of Winnipeg and Toronto, to the great benefit of all concerned, then Canada would be able to contribute in moments of emergency thousands of soldiers who, by reason of their character and efficiency, would be able to render the greatest assistance to the crown."

"I wish, gentlemen, there could be found some way of bestowing a crown of honor on that city which could show the largest number of efficient cadets in proportion to its population, and I am confident that were such an honor bestowed the spirit which animates the patriotic citizens of every one of your larger cities would not grudge the private subscription of such funds as might be necessary to enable their adopted city to win the coveted crown."

At one time Chatham had an efficient cadet corps in connection with the Collegiate Institute, but for some unexplained reason interest flagged, and this branch of the school's work has been abandoned. The above will show the importance which the Governor-General attaches to the cadet corps, and will draw attention to Chatham's negligence in this respect.

FISH AND GAME.

A branch of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association has been formed in Woodstock. In commenting upon the need for co-operation along this line the Woodstock Sentinel Review says:

"This is the way, and perhaps the only way, to arouse the public to a sense of the wonderful inheritances which they are allowing to be dissipated. With only proper and reasonable care the resources of this wonderful Province might be conserved and preserved for all time, and the whole people enjoy, in a way they have never yet done, the advantages which belong to them as inhabitants of one of the most favored places upon this earth's surface."

"In supporting the Provincial organization by forging another link in the chain, Woodstock has done well, and the local association should prove a source of strength to the parent, and to the movement generally. We believe from the enthusiastic spirit shown last night that the local branch will prove something more than a name, and that in everything which concerns these great public questions, Oxford County will prove a unit, pressing forward in the good work, and setting an example which others may be proud to follow."

"If somewhat late in the day, Woodstock can make up by enthusiastic good work for the dilatoriness of the past. A good beginning has been made; may the future show the fruition of the brilliant promises of the present!"

LOCAL LEGAL

McKenna v. Township of Osgoode.—Judgment (L.) on appeal by defendants from the judgment of J. B. Rankin, drainage referee, dated 26th March, 1906, setting aside the report of J. H. Morse, civil engineer, in the matter of the John O'Connor drainage scheme, and by-law number 9, of the township of Osgoode, provisionally adopting the report. The appellants contended that the referee erred in holding that the petition for the drainage work was not sufficiently signed; in holding that petitioners were coerced into remaining on the petition; in holding that the drainage work should have terminated at the junction of Findlay Creek and Osgoode River, and could not be carried down the Osgoode River; and in holding that the policy of the drainage act was contrary to the allowance of such a drainage work as that in question. Appeal dismissed with costs. J. B. Rankin, K. C., for appellants. F. R. Latchford, K. C., for respondents.

Rex v. Calvin B. Burr.—Judgment (L.) in Crown case stated by the Junior Judge of the County Court of Kent, acting chairman of the Kent Sessions, upon an indictment of the defendant for seducing and having illicit connection with Vera E. Stacey, a girl of previous chaste character, above fourteen and under sixteen, not being his wife. The question stated was whether the ruling of the Judge that there was not corroborative evidence to meet the requirements of sec. 684 of the criminal code was right. The court answered the question in the negative and directed a new trial. J. R. Cartwright, K. C., for the Crown. O. L. Lewis, Chatham, for defendant.
