In the fall of 1861, Owen Lovejoy, the member of congress whom I most admired, said to me: "Last week I saw Wendell Phillips in New York. He is coming to Washington. What a pity we cannot have a good anti-slavery lec-

ture from him!"
I'thought it over, conversed with one or two about it, and inserted in the Republican of the next morning a card inviting "all the young men in Washington in favor of the abolition of slavery' to meet at the residence of Louis Clephane on the next evening. There were a dozen present, including William Dodge, Delano T. Smith, John J. Piatt, now counsel to Cork, and John R. French, late sergeant-at-arms to the senate. I unfolded the project. Just then the bell rang, and a gray-

haired man was ushered in — tall, straight, with blue eyes, pink face and flowing white beard. He might have been a Druid, "I hope I am not un-welcome," he said, smrling, "for I am opposed to slavery, and I am virtually a young man." He was recognized as John Pierpont, the preacher poet, who had enlisted in the army at seventy-five, and we made him our president. We organized "The Washington Lec-ture Association" and provided for twenty anti-slavery lectures to be delivered during the winter. Among the lecturer who spoke for the first time in the south were Wendell Phillips, William Lloyd Garrison, William Goodale, Frederick Douglass, Horace Greeley and Emerson. When I went to the White House with the list and asked Mr. Lincoln if we could count upon his attend-ance sometimes, he rubbed his face with

his hands and laughed, and said he didn't know, he might come two or three times. "But these men," he added, "are ahead of me; I don't even try to that I want to hear—Wendell Phillips and Horace Greeley. Every one of Greeley's words weighs a ton, and he inpresses me very much, even when I differ from him widely. I want to hear Phillips, not for what he says, but for his way of saying it." On two or three occasions, therefore, President Lincoln sat on the platform, sometimes accom-

panied by most of his cabinet. The course was a great success.
