Only Canada, Sweden and Finland May be Depended Upon to Export Timber.

Canada is one of the very few countries which can be depended on to produce more timber than is sufficient for its needs. Such is the opinion of a great French authority. M. Melard, who has made a careful study of the world's timber supply. There are only seven countries in the world which now export wood in any quantity. Besided Canada, these are the United States, on this continent, and, in Europe, Austro-Hungary, Norway, Sweden, Russia and Finland. In Asia, only Russia has more than enough for her own use; Africa and South America can send little or no timber suitable for ordinary use, and Australia can supply little. Of the seven exporting countries mentioned, the United States, Russia and Austro-Aungary have been in-creasing in population and developing their resources so rapidly that they must soon cease to rank among ex-porting countries. Norway is over-cutting her forests and must soon decrease her export. Only three

TACOMA, Tuesday .- The body of Lillian Pratt, aged 22, who mysteriously disappeared from her home on May 27th last, was found in a dense thicket on the outskirts of the city Saturday by a surveying crew. Al

though badly decomposed, the body was identified by her father. He be-lieves she was murdered and the posttion of the body supports this theory. it having the appearance of having been dragged to the place, thrown in the hollow and partially covered with leaves.

The girl disappeared a few days be fore the date set for the wedding to Darcy Dawson, who is now believed to be in Vancouver, B. C. He spent several weeks in a futile search for the girl in the Sound cities. Miss Pratt was an active worker in the Methodist church and had a fine character. While there was no known reason for suicide it was at first believed she had taken her own life. To-day's discovery how ever, convinced her relatives that she was murdered, but no motive is suggested. This murder theory is also shared by the coroner.

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



During eighteen years of Conserva tive rule the trade with Great Britain increased \$16,297,311, or an average increase per year of \$905,406. During eleven years of Liberal rule the trade with Great Britain increased \$117,319,-460, or an average increase per year of \$10.665.406. In other words the average increase per year under Liberal rule for eleven years was almost equal to the total increase under Conservative rule for eighteen years. Conservative loyalty to Great Britain was by word of mouth, Liberal loyalty is shown by preferential tariff, granted without quid pro quo, and the result is demonstrated by the figures given above. In 1896 the trade commissions service, then known as the Canadian Commercial Agency Service, practically did not exist. It was in a chaotic state, without instructions, directions or control. The reports of agents were printed in some instances months after they were received. They are now published in the weekly report with in a few days of their receipt, and disributed all over Canada, free of charge The efficiency of this service has contributed not a little to the splendid expansion of Canada's trade, and is additional evidence of what intelligent administration of public affairs will do for a people. Canadians have much to thank the Liberal Government for, and the manufactures, and merchants should be particularly grateful for the efforts which have been made on their behalf. Again the question comes up -will the people of Canada exchange all the benefits they now enjoy, sur-render the good things made possible by a Liberal government and turn af-
