WEEK-END MARKET.
A large number of teams gathered
Saturday morning for the week-end
market at Fredericton. Meat was the
chief article of produce, beef and
pork being most plentiful. Beef sold
for 11 cents to 14 cents a pound, pork
brought from 20 to 24 cents a pound.
Lamb sold for \$1.25 to \$2.25 a quar-
ter. Butter brought from 45 cents to
50 cents a pound. Chickens sold for
35 to 40 cents a pound. The few bar-
rels of carrots on hand sold for \$1.25
a barrel and potatoes once again
brought \$3 per barrel.
