Rosborough. neither of whom are fit to be intrusted with such important interests as are placed in the care of the council.

It is certainly a grave reflection on the intelligence of Fredericton, that men like these, and some of their associates, should be permitted to play ducks and drakes with the civic business, and the electors when they awaken to the gravity of the situation, will certainly dispense with the services of such persons.

The question of sewerage, to be dealt with within the next, should be in the hands of men of greater capacity and better standing. What do the citizens of Fredericton think of entrusting the expenditure of, say at least \$50,000, to men of he Macpherson stamp.

AFRAID OF THEIR OWN SHADOWS.

The government organs do not mention North Ontario and West Huron among the constituencies in which the dates for the bye elections have been practically fixed, and yet both are vacant. West Huron, the constituency held by Hon. J. C. Patterson, now governor of Manitoba. was the first of the six seats vacated. Why not give the electors there an opportunity to pronounce on the public questions of the day. It is true the last Tory majority in that constituency was only 16, with a personally popular cabinet minister as the candidate, and the government have long since abandoned any hope of again carrying the seat. The bye elections announced in Cardwell, Missisquoi, Montreal Centre and Jacques Cartier, are all in constituencies which have returned Tories by large majorities, and hence the government propose risking their fortunes first in these.
