60 SAYS A TORONTO JURY IN A FATAL FAITH CURE CASE.

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NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Alexander Chatrian, the French novelist, is dead. President Carnot has recovered from his illness.

The miners' strike in Belgium has come to an end. An acute case of cholera has just been revealed in Berlin.

The International Temperance Congress has opened at the Norwegian capital. A railway wreck at Calais, France, killed four persons and injured twenty others.

The Liverpool trades congress has voted in favor of making the eight-hour day compulsory. The lumber firm of Horie & Mellin, at Antico, Wis., has assigned. Liabilities, \$200,000.

Eighteen cases of cholera have broken out among the young ladies of the college of Jesus and Mary in Valencia. A company has been formed in Chicago with a capital of \$3,000,000 that will control all the shoe and leather works in the States.

Stanley is enjoying himself in the Alps and has gained greatly in appetite and strength. Reports of destructive fire continue to come from Hungary. Small and several other Hungarian villages have been burned.

Fire almost totally destroyed the town of Oxford, Iowa. The post-office, bank and many other buildings were destroyed. The loss is \$25,000 to \$50,000. Lord Hartington in a speech warned the Gladstonians that contempt for, or mismanagement of, the strength of the Unionist party was likely to lead to disaster.

A number of children were injured on the Monroe county, Pennsylvania, fair grounds by a flying machine called a "razzle dazzle," similar to a merry-go-round.
