

GRAND SIGHT AT COVENT GARDEN

Scene was one Which Those Present Will Long Remember

London, June 28.—One of the most magnificent spectacles in connection with the coronation was the performance tonight in Covent Garden, the interior of which was transformed to a veritable floral palace wreathed about with England's fairest flowers.

The King and Queen drove from Buckingham Palace in a state coach escorted by Life Guards. On their arrival their Majesties were received by the chief state officers and escorted to the royal box, the whole audience being in a state of excitement.

The royal box consisted of ten boxes in the after grand tier thrown into one providing 190 seats nearly all of which were occupied by guests of royal rank. Flanking the royal box were two other large boxes each occupied by 100 representatives of foreign countries in gorgeous uniforms and the representatives of the dominions.
