

M. DELCASSE IS MOVED TO TEARS

Visits Wreck of Liberte and Criticized Defective Organization

Toulon, Sept. 27.—Now that the work of rescue is over, the attention of the authorities is occupied in establishing the cause of the responsibility for the disaster of the battleship Liberte and to devise means to prevent a recurrence of such an accident.

M. Delcasse said that it was not the delinquency of "B" powder that was responsible for the explosion. It was caused, he said, were to be sought elsewhere.
