No Explanation.

On Tuesday we referred to the Hon. M. P. Cashin's acquiescence in the enforcement of the Bait Act this year against the Americans as shown in the Harmony case, and we took occasion to comment on the supervision of Inspector O'Reilly by the Minister of Customs, Inspector O'Reilly, as is well known, has had much experience and has achieved success in carrying out the duties entrusted to him of enforcing the Bait Act. No explanation has yet been afforded of this strange action. Had as the Harmony case was, the action of the Arethusa was worse, and it is a pity that the master was not brought to justice. It would appear that the seventeen American fishermen were directed to invade Newfoundland waters and poach bait, and it appears to us that the authorities had nothing left them but to make an example of those they could catch, though most folks will be sorry that the lash of the law fell on the crew and not on the master.

The Stephano Here.

The s.s. Stephano, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 1 p.m. to-day after a good run from New York and Halifax. She left the former port at 11 a.m. Saturday, made the run to Halifax in 45 hours with very fine weather, and leaving there at 3 p.m. Tuesday had it fine but cloudy coming down here. She brought a half cargo and 165 passengers for the round trip, with 34 second class. She sails at 3 p.m. Saturday and will have a large number of passengers outward.

American Fishermen Fined for Poaching.

To-day Richard Power, Frank Redmond, James Kenny, T. Thorburn, Daniel Dooley, Wm. Bodour, W. Mews, A. Burke, Frank White, Albert Mews, Denis Fagan, Adolphe Burke, L. Goodwin, Dermont Emere, A. Harbline, Adolphe Mews and Albray Mews, seamen of the Gloucester banker Arethusa, were brought before Judge Conroy this forenoon in the police court and were charged with hauling 25 bris. of caplin at Long Beach, near Cape Race in contravention of the Bait Act. They pleaded guilty and were fined \$50 or 3 months each. The men, we understand, had two dories filled with bait and had a caplin seine when captured. The men are kept in the police station corridors under guard, and U. S. Consul Benedict has telegraphed the vessel's owners, Cunningham, Thompson & Co., Gloucester, to arrange about the payment of the fine imposed. The Consul thinks from messages he has received that the Arethusa will go to St. Pierre, and when the fine is adjusted he will send the men there by the Rosalind Saturday via Sydney.

Trouble With Firemen

To-day 8 men, firemen and oilers, of the S. S. Stephano quit the ship on her arrival here, and Delegate Woods, of the Firemen's Union, interviewed by the Telegram to-day stated that the men were signed at Halifax and proceeded to New York where Capt. Clarke signed on new men, took the others down here and cast them adrift in port keeping the foreigners. The men with Delegate Woods had the advice of a legal man to-day, and will endeavour to call a meeting of the Labourers' Union to-night with the view of a general strike out of sympathy for the stokers.

Picked Up Castaways.

On the 8th inst. the Arethusa picked up two Portia castaways in a dory each astray in a dense fog on the Banks. Their christian names are Antonir and Peter, but what their surnames are is not known as they speak no English. They had been adrift nearly 3 days, were greatly exhausted, and are still on board the Arethusa. They describe their vessel by signs as being a large three-masted schooner. They had neither grub nor water in their dory when found.

FIVE NEWFOUNDLANDERS.—Messrs. Power, Redmond, Kenny, Thorburn and Dooley of the Gloucester schr. Arethusa, and now in prison here, are Newfoundlanders who have been fishing out of Gloucester for several years.

BANKER HAS SICK MEN.—The banker Australia, Louis Rowe, master, arrived here from the Grand Banks last evening. She has 600 fish of this trip and 1,000 to her credit to date for 8 dories. Len Byrd, one of the crew, is ill of mumps, and Herbert Moulton is developing them. Both were visited and treated by a doctor to-day.

FINE FISH DISPLAY.—Mr. F. W. Ayre, President of the Twing Twang Club, has a fine show of trout in Ayre & Sons' window. They were caught in No Man's Pond, which on a rough calculation amounts to 100 miles from "Nowhere." These trout, 7 in number, are on exhibition to-day and their weights aggregate 10 lbs. 8 1/2 oz. One fish weighs 3 lbs.

Caste Law.

It is difficult for a European to realize the insuperable barriers which separate the castes of India, but the following may be interesting. The Hindus are divided into over three thousand castes, most of them with sub-castes, speak about nineteen developed languages, and over one hundred dialects.

There are two essentials to a true caste: (1) There is no entry, except by birth; (2) marriage outside the caste is absolutely forbidden. The highest caste is the Brahmans, admittedly and undoubtedly superior to all the rest. After them come those who are acknowledged to be twice born. The less honored follow in a graduated descent until the untouchable and unspicable are reached at the lowest depth.

If a man is excommunicated by his caste-fellows, nobody in the caste will marry him. He is dead to his family. Nobody will eat or drink with him. If he is married his wife will not touch him or speak to him. The village barber will not shave him, and the washerwoman will not wash his clothes.—Indian Daily News.
