An Open Letter to the Hon. Donald Morison.

Dear Sir,-I recently returned to this city after being absent from the Colony for about five months, and on looking over the daily papers, I saw that you wrote a letter to Sir E. P. Morris on April 20th past, in which you made certain reflections on me. In that letter I find the following statements:-

"His Excellency is correct in assuming that neither the Company nor the Government knew, when the applications were made and dealt with, that a very large proportion of the land applied for was absolutely worthless. The Company relied upon representations made by Mr. Strong, which have turned out to be wholly false."

"When the Company made their applications they relied upon Mr. Strong's representations, and expected, out of the large area applied for, to be able to select one or more eligible sites for pulp mills. Since they they have completed the survey of a large portion of the area and will have to reject at least four fifths of the total quantity applied for because of being barren and worthless."


