Searching for Slayer.

Several Witnesses Saw the Bandit Kill the Bank Manager. Winnipeg, Dec. 4.—The man-hunt for

Bank of Montreal, became keen tonight when provincial detectives traced the fugitive to within twelve miles of the city. Provincial and city police

now believe their quarry to be in hid-ing here, and the nooks and crannies of the city are being pierced to bring him to justice.

In the provincial jail is held William Dyck, the driver of the car which carried the bandit away. Dyck has many things to explain to the police, ond many contradictions to straighten out First, he told the officers at Plumcoufee that he had driven the men within two miles of Morris. Detectives tracked the car to a point eigh-

teen miles northwest of Morris, and saw the wheel marks where it turned round. Secondly, the liveryman must explain about \$240 in silver, which was found beneath the back of the car.
