Miss Vera Tisdale, of London, spent last week with Mrs. Will Harper.

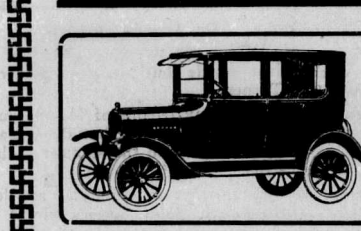
