### An Omaha Man Imprisoned by Flames

The Doors Barred. OMAHA, Neb., March 25 .- Cornelius McGuire, a well-known machinist, was yesterday morning virtually burned to death in his shop, where he was sleeping in the absence of his family in Chicago. The doors and windows had been barred from the outside and the house was fired by some unknown person. Unable to get out of the front door, he rushed through the fire to the rear, but found the heat and smoke stifling. McGuire's night-clothes were on fire and his body was being burned in a horrible manner. Crazed with pain, he made a last effort to escape and again rushed through the flames to the front part of the building, where he hurled himself against the door and burst it open. With the aid of his hands and knees he made his way to parties a block distant. He died soon after. There is no clue to the

#### incendiary. PROTECTION IN HAMILTON.

It Has Been Fatal to Many Industries. (From the Hamilton Times.)

There are few industries in Hamilton doing as well under protection today as they did under the revenue tariff previous to 1879. Take the foundry and furniture trades, for instance. In the four years preceding 1879, every foundry in Hamilton was enlarged, and those establishments supplied employment all the year round, except during a lay-off of a couple of weeks at Christmas for stock-taking. Today the Stewart foundry premises and the Laidlaw foundry premises are empty, and the Williams foundry premises are occupied by a blacking and essence factory, removed to it from another part of the city. Nobody would think of erecting a new foundry under present circumstances, for the old ones are busy less than twothirds of the year. Under the low tariff Hoodless & Son enlarged their furniture business and opened their big warehouse on King street. J. Zingsheim made the money with which he afterwards built and equipped his splendid furniture factory (now empty and dismantled) on Mary street. Who would put a dollar into a new furniture factory today? Our sewing machine industry, which used to employ several hundred men at good wages when the tariff was low, has "gone where the woodbine twineth" under protection. One of the sewing machine buildings is used for law offices, another for a livery stable, a third for a laundry and electric light factory, a fourth as a tin shop, and the biggest one of all, down on Barton street, has been empty for years, eating its head off with taxes and interest. Hamilton Grits may be pardoned for thinking that factories would be better off under a low tariff than under high protection; their condition could hardly be worse than it is

#### today, under any system.

IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

Federation. ST. JOHNS, Nfld., March 24 -The public meeting under the auspices of the Anti-Confederation League, which opposed the plan for the union of Newfoundland with Canada, was one of the most enthusiastic meetings ever held here. Resolutions were passed requesting the Colonial Government not to send the Confederation delegates to Canada, but to ask, instead, for a royal commission from England. The anti-confederation feeling is evidently very strong, and the plan of sending a delegation to Ottawa decidedly unpopular. However, popular

clamor seems likely to prove of no avail. In all probability the delegation, which is already named, will soon proceed to Ottawa. Premier Sir Wm. Whiteway continues very ill, and cannot accompany his col-leagues in the delegation when they leave Newfoundland, but intends following them when sufficiently recovered. Besides the Premier, the delegation as named will consist of Messrs. Robert Bond, Geo. Emerson and Edward Morris. It is understood that the Government has not yet asked for the co-operation of the Opposition as re-
