Thomas Wilson, of Dutton, from the King Street Presbyterian Church, of London, which was represented by Messrs. Cheesebrough, Black, McLean, Edy, McHattie, Patterson and McKay. Eight commissioners from the Dutton congregation also appeared to oppose the acceptance of the call-a high tribute to Mr. Wilson. Very effective speeches were made on both sides, particularly by the Dutton commissoners. MARRIAGE LAWS AMENDED. Berlin, July 15 .- The Federal Council has rejected the Oleomargarine Bill, which was recently passed by the Reichstag. This bill, had it become law, would, in effect, have prohibited the importation of oleomargarine from the United States. The council adopted the Civil Code Bill, relating to civil marriage and the property rights of married women. This bill was passed by the Reichstag on July 1. One provision of this law makes a civil ceremony compulsory, and another makes 21 years the limit of age at which parental consent is requisite. In the preliminary stages of the bill a clause was stricken out which makes incurable insanity a ground for divorce.

THE PARIS SENSATION.

President Faure's Assailant Probably a Innatic-Says He Used No Bullet

Paris, July 15 .- It is stated that the man who shot at President Faure yesterday at Longchamps is Francois. the same lunatic who recently threw a bundle of petitions from the gallery of the Chamber of Deputies into the body of the House, thereby causing a semi-panic among the members, who imagined that the bundle was a bomb. Francois, when examined by Prefect Peine, said that in discharging the revolver he merely

The special offense which led to his discharge was the publication of revolutionary verses. His residence was searched by the police, but nothing of a suspicious nature was found. The officials believe that he is insane. During the commotion which followed the firing a reputed Anarchist named Boulant was arrested for saying, "That's the sort of fellow for me. He has done the proper thing." This approval of the outrage is a penal offense under the anti-anarchy laws, and Boulant stands a good chance of spending a few years in prison. One of his eyes was torn from its socket, and he was almost lynched before the police were able to rescue him. The news of the shooting had preceded the President to Paris, and as he was recognized by the people on the streets, through which he passed on his return, he was greeted with cheers and congratulations. In the evening the diplomats and a large number of prominent men called at the palace of the Elysee and congratulated M. Faure.

Several sovereigns sent telegraphic messages of congratulation. Many persons believe the story of the prisoner that he had no intention of harming the President. It is evident from the facts that have been learned that M. Faure would not have been in any great danger, even if Francois had used ball cartridges. Francois stood behind the troops, who lined the wide road, and at the time the President's carriage were trotting fast. The carriage was surrounded by a cavalry escort, who raised a cloud of dust, which obscured the carriage and its occupants from view. Had ball cartridges been used it is probable that one of the cavalrymen, rather
