The event was skated in three heats, with 13 laps to the mile. The first heat was painfully slow, both skaters loafing after the second lap. Galbraith spurted in the fourth lap, and drew away from Hefferman, and kept the lead up for the remaining nine laps, winning by about 25 yards. In the second heat Hefferman took the lead in the third lap and kept it to the end. Galbraith kept right close to. but making no attempt to pass him. The time for the first heat was 4:28 and the second In the last heat both men started in at a pretty fast clip, having been warned by George Black, who officiated, that unless better time was made the race would be declared off. Hefferman fell in the second half while turning a corner, and Galbraith voluntarily stopped and agreed to start the mile again. In the second start Hefferman narrowly escaped a bad fall in the first lap, and Galbraith pulled out, and at the end of the eighth round had a lap to his credit. Hefferman again fell in the tenth lap, and decided to quit. The time was 3:32. Hefferman, it was easily seen, was in too fast company. He was unable to take the corners without losing ground, while this was one of Galbraith's strong points.
