NEWS IN A NUTSHELL

General elections may be held in Newfoundland in May.

Wm. Jewell was killed by a railway engine at St. Thomas.

Fire in Corry, Pa., Sunday, caused losses aggregating \$325,000.

Crowds clapped hands as President McKinley entered the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York on Sunday morning.

Sir William Macdonald has presented four pounds of tobacco to each non-commissioned officer and man of the Strathcona Horse.

Millard Hughes is dead and several others are badly wounded in Smallwood, Ky., where a dance broke up in a shooting match.

Over one hundred thousand copies per day of the Populists (Keks) Daily Capital are already ordered for this week, during which Rev. C. M. Sheldon is to run it as he thinks Jesus would be likely to do.

The report of the absorption of the Atlantic Transport Steamship Line by the Leyland Line is confirmed in New York. The combine is capitalized at \$25,000,000. The corporation will be English.

A proclamation has been issued by Gov. Stanley, declaring a quarantine, which practically excludes the shipment of dairy cattle into Kansas. The quarantine is established in order to prevent the further introduction of tuberculosis into Kansas herds.

Only four of the fourteen Manitoba moose shipped to New Zealand arrived safe at their destination.

Fire early this (Tuesday) morning at Kingston, N. Y., destroyed a large four-story brick building owned by Louis E. Gilling & Sons, with a big stock of clothing. "The American Express Company's office and 'The Arcade' were also damaged. The loss will reach \$75,000.

The Strathcona Horse will leave Ottawa on Monday, 12th inst., in three trains, starting at 8, 9 and 10 o'clock for Montreal, where there will be a parade in the afternoon, but the stay in Montreal cannot be a long one, as the Montereys will be ready to sail from Halifax on Thursday, 15th.

The Marquis and Marchioness of Hertford have arrived at Ottawa from England to bid adieu to their son, Lord Edward Seymour, who goes to South Africa with Strathcona's Horse. Lord Edward Seymour, who is a lad of 20, has been in British Columbia for less than a year, but was one of the first to volunteer for service under Col. Steele.

Another son of the Marquis is in the Grenadier Guards, and he awaits news daily that he has sailed for South Africa with the 5th division. Still another son is a midshipman on board the flagship which recently sailed from Halifax for the southern seas.
