METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Dec. 29-3 p.m.—The low
area which was passing up the Gulf
Stream yesterday is now centered near
Sable Island, and is crossing quickly
northeast and to Southern Newfoundland.
It is accompanied by snow and
high winds. The pressure continues
high over the Northwest, attended by
decidedly cold weather. This is ex-
tending to the lakes, and the outlook
is for decidedly cold weather from Man-
itoba to the Atlantic. Minimum and
maximum temperatures: Kamloops,
32-38; Calgary, 2 below-8; Qu'Appelle,
24 below-2; Winnipeg, 14 below-zero;
Port Arthur, 14 below-10 below; Parry
Sound, 8 below-zero; Toronto, 10-14;
Ottawa, 6-8; Montreal, 16-18; Quebec,
10-18; Halifax, 16-32.
Local temperatures: The highest and
lowest readings of the thermometer at
the observatory here on Friday, Dec.
29, were: Highest, 14.5°; lowest, 7°.
Sun rises today at 7:52, and sets at
4:50. Moon rises at 5:54 a.m., and sets
at 3:05 p.m.

MORE MEN TO BE SENT

Twenty Extra Mounted Rifles To
Be Enlisted.

London Will Send Between 50
and 60 Volunteers.

The First Hussar Men Already Enrolled
—Four Artillerymen To Be
Chosen.

Col. Holmes returned to London last
night. While in Toronto he conferred
with Col. Kitson, who is supervising
the enlistment of the mounted rifles,
and learned from him that London
would send twenty men more than was
at first intended. This will total 30 or
40 men. The change will be welcomed
by the cavalrymen of the district. This
section was filled up rapidly, and word
was issued that no more men would
be accepted. Now those who were eager
to go, but were too late before, will
have an opportunity.

Field Battery, in order to go to the
front.

Col. Holmes does not know definitely
when the men will leave London. He
hopes to have them in condition in a
short time.

start.

There should be joy for the people of
this city in the announcement that one
of the best laugh-makers of our genera-
tion, "What Happened to Jones," is
booked for another appearance at the
Grand New Year's matinee. The au-
thor has succeeded in putting the most
mirthful scenes and situations ever de-
vised into the shortest space of time.
In fact, the curtain has scarcely arisen
upon the first act before there is a
chuckle, which presently broadens in-
to a roar, which is kept up without
subsiding for two hours and a half.
The fun is clean and intelligent. The
spectator thinks while he laughs. There
is nothing to offend anyone, and there

Alden Benedict's "Fazio Romani,"

DROWNED.

Hamilton, Dec. 30. — Percy Bur-
rows, 12 years of age, who resided
with his parents on East Cannon
street, was drowned in the inlet near
the smelting works dock yesterday
morning. Burrows, with other lads,
was skating on thin ice, when his
brother Willie went through, and Percy
jumped in to rescue him. While was
pulled out by a man named Clenden-
ning, who witnessed the accident from

his barn close by, but before he could
reach Percy the latter went down for
the last time. The body was recovered
shortly afterwards by the police.

SUDDEN DEATH IN SEAFORTH.

Seaforth, Dec. 30.—While Mrs. Chap-
man, aged 62 years, of Tuckersmith-
township, was attending to some pur-
chases Thursday evening in A. G.
Auld's grocery store here, she was sud-
denly taken ill. Medical aid was
quickly summoned, and the lady was
conveyed to the house of a friend where
she died at midnight. Heart trouble
is given as the cause of death.
