RESIST VACCINATION

"Lo" Is Opposed to I rocculation-Smallpox in Anderdon, Essex.

Toronto, Jan. 13 .- "In the matter of anti-vaccination the Indian is becoming quite civilized," writes the special commissioner sent by the provincial board of health to attend to the Indians who have smallpox on the reserve near Deseronto. He reports that of 206 braves whom he broached on the subject of vaccination, six firmly refused to be touched. Several new cases of the disease were reported today from Anderdon, in Essex County. The City of Toronto's health during the last year was well up to the average, and the death rate fell per-The annual report of medical health officer shows that there was not an unusual number of cases of contagious diseases. The number of scarlet fever cases increased 145, but this was the result of an epidemic early in the year, that did not seem attributable to any special cause. The cases decreased towards the end of the year. In 1901 there

were 119 cases of typhoid fever, 962

of diphtheria, and 855 of scarlet fever.

Last year the typhoid cases numbered

130, diphtheria 893, scarlet fever 701.

ACROSS THE CONTINENT

Extension of the Intercolonial Railway Advocated by St. Joseph People.

St. John, N. B., Jan. 14.-The St. John Board of Trade yesterday afterncon at a largely attended meeting held to take action in regard to the proposed Grand Trunk line across Canada, and the Quebec scheme of the trans-Canada line, passed the follow

ing resolutions: The St. John Board of Trade places itself on record as favoring the exten-sion of the Intercolonial Railway from Montreal across the continent through Canadian territory, and improvement of harbor facilities, particularly on the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Maritime Province coasts."

It was also moved "that in granting charters to transcontinental railway lines, it should be the policy of the Government not to grant a subsidy either of money or lands to such railway lines, but rather to consider that the right-of-way given by such charter is a valuable franchise owned by the people, and should be guarded so that it would revert to the people, if so desired; and further, that all such transcontinental railway charters should specify that the eastern terminus in winter and summer must be a Canadian port."

Doukhobors Doing Better.

Winnipeg, Jan. 14.-From the Swan River, a Doukhobor colony, the news is of an encouraging nature. Peter Verigin, the Doukhobor leader, is actively engaged in studying the entire situation, and as far as his present attitude can be judged, it is probable that he will exert his undoubted influence on the side of the Government and do all in his power to dissuade and discourage such outbreaks as have marked a portion of the disciples of the Universal Brotherhood since their location in Canada.

It is reported that the couple married in the belief that Emperor Francis Joseph and King Leopold together would contribute handsomely to their maintenance. In this, however, they were disappointed. The Emperor gave the countess \$25,000 a year only, while King Leopold stopped her former allowance of \$10,000 e year. The countess consequently tried to meet all the expenses of main-taining her household with one-fifth of her former income and found the task impossible.

She used the influence of her daughter, Archduchess Elizabeth-Marie, who is a favorite with the Austrian Emperor, to secure additional money, but since the latter's marriage to Prince von Windeschgraetz, the prince has interfered to prevent his wife from continuing to act as intermediary between her mother and her grandfather,

Canadian Timber Wanted. Ottawa, Jan. 14.-The greater part of



It has been announced that the logs that will be taken off the million-dollar limit the Petewawa, recently purchased by McLachlan Bros., from Robt. Barnet, Renfrew, will be manufactured into lumber at the Arnprior mills.

Late Senator McCallum.

Dunnville, Ont., Jan. 14.-The Hon Lachlan McCallum, who died at his home in Stromness, yesterday, was born on March 15, 1823, in the Island of Tiree, Argyle, and came to Canada in 1842. In 1856 he married Miss Priscilla Dawson, who died a number of years ago. He is survived by one son and three daughters, who were all with him when the end came. He was a member of the Presbyterian and a Mason, having founded McCallum Chapter of Masons, which was named after him, and being its first principal. Coming here in its early history, he has been identified with and a leader in every forward movement in the place. Senator McCallum was large contractor and shipbuilder, having built many public works and owned a fleet of vessels on the lakes. He was captain of the Dunnville Naval Company, which he commanded at Fort Erie, at the time of the Fenian raid in June, 1866, where he was in the thick of the fight, and was afterwards presented with a medal for conspicuous bravery. He entered public life in 1867, and sat in the commons almost continuously until 1887, when he was called to the senate. He sat in the Ontario Assembly in 1876 and 1878. He was a Conservative in politics.

TEMISKAMING

Arrangements Being Made for Terminals of the Road

At Nipissing Junction, or North Junction-Several Contracts Made.

Toronto, Jan. 14.-A committee of the Temiskaming Railway Commission, comprising A. E. Ames (chair-K. C. (counsel), W. B. Russell (engineer), and P. E. Ryan (secretary), will go to Montreal this week to discuss with the authorities of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific terminal arrangements for the new road at North Bay or Nipissing Junction, or at both points.

Nipissing Junction is a point three miles east of North Bay, where the G. T. R. strikes the main line of the C. P. R. At present the Grand Trunk runs into North Bay over Canadian Pacific tracks, but has purchased a right of way into the town over which can construct a line at any time. It s expected that when the C. P. R. builds its Kleinburg and Sudbury extension its present agreement with the G. T. R. will be abrogated. In any event the commission is anxious that some arrangement will be reached with both lines which will preserve the interests of the new Temiskaming line. The commission has placed an order with the Toronto Forge and Bolt Company for sufficient track bolts for 60 miles of main line and 5 miles of sidings. An order for spikes to cover the same distance of road has been placed with the Dillow & Hersey Company, of Montreal. The contractor for the line is to place an order for 75 60-ton M. C. R. standard flat cars with automatic couplers and Westinghouse airbrakes. These cars will be used in construction work and on the completion of the road will be taken

over by the commision on a valuation.

Canadian Enterprise in Mexico. Montreal, Que., Jan. 14.-A number of prominent Canadian capitalists have obtained concessions for the construction of a big power plant near the city of Mexico, and a company with a capital of \$12,000,000 has been formed o conduct the work. James Ross, Senator Cox, William MacKenzie and other well-known Canadians are interested in the project, and have underwritten most of the stock of the new company.
