CRESCUS, KING OF TROTTERS.

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 19.—Crescus broke the world's trotting record for a mile this afternoon, going the distance in 1:59 3-4, beating the previous record held by Lou Dillon and Major Delmar by a quarter of a second. Weather and track conditions were of the best. Crescus went the first quarter in 30 seconds, the half in 59 3-4, the three-quarters in 1:30. Just before he reached the wire Crescus broke, and it is believed lost three-quarters of a second. No wind shield was used. Crescus was paced by Mike the Tramp.

DILLON TO MEET MAJOR DELMAR

Gold Challenge Cup Will Bring Them Together at Memphis—Delmar the Favorite.

With the trotters and pacers at Memphis this week, the beginning of the end of a glorious light harness season is at hand. The programme at the Tennessee track is one that promises sensational racing. In one event alone the meeting will be unique, in that it will virtually list the first two-minute class in history, when Major Delmar and Lou Dillon meet in the race for the Memphis Gold Challenge Cup. This race, of course, is for amateur drivers only, so that Mr. Billings will pilot Dillon, while Mr. Smathers will be behind Delmar. Mr. Smathers won the cup last season with Lord Derby, defeating Mr. Billings, who had the Monk in. The Memphis track is phenomenally fast, and will be the scene of a number of record trials, though the cup race is naturally the event of greatest interest. In the betting Major Delmar is quoted favorite at 4 to 5, while 5 to 1 is laid against Lou Dillon. Although Dillon is considered by many to be a trifle more speedy than the gelding, Delmar is looked upon as the better racer, and his backers of C. K. G. Montreal, Oct. 20.—Judgment has been delivered in the action of W. J. Poupore, a contractor, against the Lachine Rapids and Hydraulic Company, in which the former sued for \$26,463.93 for additional work done to the Lachine Rapids dam in 1899 and 1900. The company entered a counter suit against Mr. Poupore for \$46,100 for breach of contract. The court after a long trial, awarded Mr. Poupore \$20,505.35 and costs excepting those of the witnesses.

JOHN MORLEY, M.P. GOES FOR JOSEPH

Ex-Liberal Chief Secretary for Ireland Arouses Great Enthusiasm.

London, Oct. 20.—John Morley, who has been in semi-retirement while writing his "Life of William Ewart Gladstone," returned to active political life last night and took his place in the fighting line against the protectionist policy of the present Government.

In historic Free Trade Hall at Manchester, the biographer of Gladstone and Gladstone's address to an audience which filled the large edifice, aroused immense enthusiasm by an eloquent and spirited attack on the new policy, against which, he declared, he was arrayed with the whole weight of authority, both practical and theoretical. So crude, raw and unthought-out were the proposals launched in this country, he said, that men of all parties, Liberals and Conservatives, were united in opposition to them. The country, continued Mr. Morley, has been invited to give up its ancestral, like Cobden, Bright and Peel, up to cheap auction; but when he thought how right Cobden and Bright had been as to free trade, the French treaty of 1860, the Crimean war and the American war, he was not going to apologise for them.

Proceeding to refute the assertion that free trade had been a failure, Mr. Morley pointed out to the enormous growth in branches of trade under that policy and said that under free trade, wages had risen 15 per cent, while the average price of food had fallen 30 per cent. He declared that free imports were the only key to national prosperity, and to tamper with the taxation of food as the Government might do, would do deadly mischief. Death of a Bret Harte Hero.

New York, Oct. 20.—A dispatch from Chinese Camp, Cal., says: J. P. Chamberlain, from whom one of the heroes of Bret Harte's famous "Tennessee's Partner" was drawn, shot and killed himself at his home at Second Garrote in a fit of despondency.

On account of Harte's story Chamberlain's name as well as his home came into world-wide prominence. He left a note saying that he had lived to his eighty-first birthday, was getting too feeble for manual labor, and would choose death. Chaffee, who was the "Partner" in the celebrated story, died in an Oakland sanitarium on July 21 last. He was 80 years old. "Tennessee's Partner" and "Partner" Chaffee had been friends since 1859, and there existed between them a chivalrous affection. When it was found necessary to remove Chaffee to Oakland that he might receive medical aid, the two old men were broken.
