The C. P. R. still continues its work of beautifying its system. Preparations are now being made to ship 100,000 bulbs and section flowers along the line, so that they may be utilized in the 500 flower gardens from coast to coast.

A HUNTER'S PARADISE.

Mr. Alex Watson, of this city, who was attached to the surveying party which started from Swift Current, Assn., and surveyed the country to the north, has just returned here. He reports that the land abounds in game, such as antelope, wild geese, ducks, prairie chickens, etc. The country is for the most part level, though around the Saskatchewan River, it is very hilly. There are no settlers in that part of the country, and there are very few outside of five miles from the railroads in the lower sections.

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GOOD PROGRESS ALONG THE LINE

Second Day's Sessions of the London Branch W. M. S. M. C.—Interesting Statistics.

The second day's session of the London Conference branch of the Women's Missionary Society, the Methodist Church, held in Stratford, opened with attendance of officers and delegates.

At Tuesday afternoon's meeting two candidates for mission work, Miss Martin, of London, and Miss Weeks, of Gloucester, were introduced. The ten delegates of the branch reported progress all along the line, both numerically and financially. Greetings were tendered from the W. F. M. S. of St. Andrew's, Baptist, Knox churches, and from the Stratford and Ontario W. C. T. U. unions.

A service was held in memory of 30 members reported as having died since last convention. The session was closed by the communion.

At the evening session the secretary reported the total membership of the society to be 2,385, an increase of 210; churches and bands, 90, an increase of 2; life members, 228, an increase of 44; total dues, \$120, an increase of \$11. The finances as reported by the treasurer were most satisfactory. The total funds amounting to \$1,000, of which \$200 was a gross total of \$822.20, increase of \$47.18 on this account, and \$178.18, owing to a bequest of \$50.

At yesterday morning's meeting, invitations were received to hold the next convention at St. Mary's, St. Thomas and Mitchell. St. Thomas was chosen. Greetings were sent to Mrs. Harrison, Dresden, third vice-president; Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Dickson, of London. Committee work took up the remainder of the session.

WAS MIDDLESEX PIONEER

Death of Mr. James Dore, a Resident for Nearly Fifty Years.

The death of James Dore, one of Middlesex's oldest residents, occurred at his home at Lambeth, Wednesday, after an illness of seven weeks. Mr. Dore was in his 84th year. He was born near Gannaque, in the county of Leeds, in 1822. When 15 years old, he followed his father, a farmer, to the lumbering business. The following year, in 1837, he married Hannah, eldest daughter of David and Elizabeth Dore, of Lambeth, Ontario, county of Wentworth, and in 1856 he came west and settled on lot 24, corner of a Delaware Township, where he lived and prospered on the old farm near Littleton. Besides his wife, Mr. Dore is survived by seven children, who mourn the loss of a kind father. The children are Mrs. J. H. Small, St. Thomas; Mrs. R. Thomas and Mrs. George Harward, Manitoba; Oliver E. Niagara Falls; David G. Littlewood; Frank E. Scottville, and William St. Thomas. Three years ago deceased sold the old home, and moved to Lambeth, where he lived in quietude. Mr. Dore was a member of the Methodist Church. In politics he was a Liberal. The family have the sympathy of the large circle of friends in their bereavement. The funeral will take place on Friday at 2:30 p.m. to North Street Burial Ground.

CLUB IS GROWING

The Travellers' Organization Wants New Club Rooms.

At a meeting of the commercial travellers' club of this city, held at the club rooms in the Masonic Temple, it was decided to reorganize the club on new lines. For one thing, the club has been so successful that it has outgrown its present quarters. It is after new and larger apartments, and the following committee was appointed to look after this matter and to engage the services of a capable steward or stewards: Messrs. B. S. Murray, T. Edwards, H. M. Scarra, J. W. Cause, and S. F. Glass. The club is also desirous of getting a regular clubhouse, and to this end the following arrangements: Messrs. E. Sifton, H. W. Lind, J. S. Townsend, E. W. Maguire, and J. Dwyer. The club will probably be organized as a limited stock company.

MORE BAD BOYS

Batch of Nine May Be Arrested for Derailing a Car.

Bad boys to the number of nine caused trouble for Detective Skirving recently. The boys were feeling mischievous, and were determined to raise ructions with a flat car, which was standing on the Hill street tracks. They tried to get the car started by pushing it, and it was by dint of hard shoving that it moved down the grade towards the bridge. It was a lucky thing that the car jumped the block, and did not reach the main line. Otherwise it might have got mixed up with trains from the south. The railway company is tired of this kind of dangerous practical jokes, and is determined to prosecute the offenders vigorously. Chief Detective Skirving has got the names of the whole nine youngsters, and it is more than probable that they will all be arrested.

The letter was most satisfactory, giving a brief outline of the little fellow's life with his foster parents, and also telling of his so far successful training. Other letters were received, asking for children to be home to go out as help, and still others were from parents, asking to have their little ones admitted to the home. Much other business was transacted—part of a routine nature, part with regard to necessary repairs to the rear of the home and infirmary.
