WOULD WEAN PUBLIC FROM MR. ROOSEVELT

Diabolical Plot to Discredit the Former President Is Said to Be Under Way.

New York, Nov. 12.—Friends of former President Theodore Roosevelt are today preparing to fight what they declare to be a diabolical plot to discredit his administration. They assert that the giant monopolists, interests of the country, alarmed at never before by the growth of sentiment for Roosevelt which, starting with the first speech made by President Taft in the west endorsing the new tariff bill and defending Senator Aldrich against the assaults of the progressive Republicans, followed the President throughout his sixteen thousand mile trip and today is in evidence in every section of the country, and plan to check it by trying to prove that Roosevelt protected the sugar trust, the tobacco trust and the powder monopoly, through his attorney-general, Charles Jerome Bonaparte.

Finance and politics are being mixed, according to Roosevelt's friends. Every big monopoly accused by Roosevelt, they assert, is concerned in an attempt to check the Roosevelt movement. Money is no object, declare the friends of the former president and friends of the business interests, are to be sacrificed to discredit, if possible, the strenuous former president.

The Rooseveltians see the beginning of the plot in the circulation by a monopoly of the report that Roosevelt was dead in Africa. This, they declare, was but a feeder to ascertain beyond doubt just how strong Roosevelt was in the country. The response was spontaneous and unmistakable. Roosevelt seemed as much the popular idol as when he was in Washington, flooding Congress with messages denouncing "wickedness in high places."

Then, according to the people who believe the former president is to be made a victim of the hatred of the "interests," came the first broadside. "The one New York newspaper," which is supposed to be closed to the money powers and the one that has continuously opposed the African lunacy, printed a page and a half story which purported to prove that the prosecution of the sugar trust was protected by President Roosevelt.

A LINTYPE COMBINE.
London, Nov. 12.—At the annual meeting of the Lintype Machinery Limited, the chairman said the company today stood free of debt, and there would now be a standardization of the machines of the three companies, and an interchange of patents and improvements to the printing trade throughout the world, which would benefit by a combination of interests.

CONTRACTS FOR QUEENS.
Kingston, Nov. 12.—The new chemistry building given to the Kingston School of Mining by the Ontario Government, will be erected by Michael Sullivan, whose tender of \$60,000 was the lowest. The work will proceed at once. Other Kingstonians got the painting, plumbing and electrical contracts.

JUST THROWING DUST IN THE PEOPLE'S EYES

Real Estates Feel Strongly in Regard to the Stories of New Factories for London.

The statements given out by Ald. Stewart in regard to the proposed location of two new factories here, was the subject of some discussion at the meeting of the Real Estate Owners' Association last night, and it is stated that the association came within an ace of passing a strong resolution against such statements being made.

Just Throwing Dust.
"The whole thing is just like an attempt to throw dust in the people's eyes," said one member of the association to The Advertiser. "If those who are talking about the new factories would get busy and try to reduce the tax rate, so that London might have the strongest inducement in the shape of a low tax rate to offer prospective factories, it would be more to the point. Every now and then some alderman comes out with some rubbish about a big new factory. The factory, however, never comes, and won't as long as things are going as they are in London."

It was also hinted that one of the firms mentioned is tendering for the proposed underground work for Niagara power in London, the bylaw for which will come before the people in January, and it was with the object of making money for the scheme that the statement of a factory for London was given out.

AFTER ANCIENT TREASURE

Expedition to Seek Ark of Covenant and Aaron's Rod.
London, Nov. 12.—A romantic search for ancient treasure is now going on near Jerusalem. The seekers are a party of well-known Englishmen, including Capt. M. B. Parker, Mr. Duff, Clarence Wilson and Cyril Ward, and the treasure the most valued possessions of the ancient Jews.

One of the highest authorities on Palestine exploration in this country told the story of the search. "The whole expedition," he said, "is the result of the claim of the Norwegian engineer who is with the party to have discovered a cryptogram in the Talmud, one of the holy books of the Jews."

This engineer states that he has an expert knowledge of Hebrew and that by supernatural guidance he was enabled to find in certain pages of the Talmud, a hidden record of the burying of the treasure of Solomon's temple in the neighborhood of Jerusalem.

"Among other things," the expedition hopes to find is the Ark of the Covenant, Aaron's rod and the famous seven-branched candlestick. The engineer's story as he claims to have found it in the Talmud is that after the sack of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar some Jews obtained possession of this treasure and buried it. He left a record of where it was hidden, and this record was afterwards incorporated with the Talmud in a cryptic manner hitherto undiscovered."

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INJUNCTION GRANTED AGAINST PORT ARTHUR

City Restrained From Entering Into a Contract With the Hydro Commission.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 12.—Justice Clute has granted an injunction till the trial of the action of George W. Horrigan against the City of Port Arthur, restraining the city from entering into a contract with the hydro-electric commission.

Mr. Justice Clute finds that the by-law was bad because it did not contain estimates required by statute, and because it had not the requisite publication. The city will go direct to the court of appeal.

NOT AFTER TARIFF WAR WITH CANADA

It Is Not Likely United States Will Apply the Maximum Tariff Against This Country.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—No intimation of any kind whatever has been received here as to whether or not the American maximum or minimum tariff will be applied to Canada.

There is a growing disposition on both sides of the line, however, that Canada will not get as much of the maximum tariff as was at first supposed, and this because the United States is not at all disposed to enter upon a tariff war with Canada.

It is regarded as likely that in the interpretation of the Payne tariff by United States authorities Canada will get a mixture of the maximum and minimum schedules.

ARBUCKLES TO PAY UP

Said To Be Seeking Compromise Over Sugar Refunds.

New York, Nov. 12.—It developed today that another large sugar importing concern, the Arbuckle Bros. Company, have been negotiating for the purpose of turning into the United States treasury duties on sugar imports which the Government authorities claim should have been paid on past shipments. There is persistent report that arbitrators have already been found.

The belief is, however, that these arbitrators have been sealed, and that negotiations now pending for the purpose of effecting a compromise whereby on a full refund of all duties these indemnities would be dismissed. It is believed that the refund contemplated aggregates several hundred thousand dollars.

NEW ORLEANS WANTS IT

Will Make Bid for Jeffries-Johnson Mill.

New Orleans, Nov. 12.—Harry W. Fitzpatrick, president of the Southern Athletic Club, of this city, says that he will leave tonight for New York to bid for the Jeffries-Johnson mill on behalf of local promoters. He expressed the belief that there would be no opposition to holding the fight here if it could be secured.

AUSTRALIA'S COAL STRIKE

Has Extended to New South Wales, and No Peace in Sight.

Melbourne, Nov. 12.—The extension of the coal strike in New South Wales is causing a serious outlook. It is reported that the Riverside workers throughout Australia will strike Tuesday.

Many of the over-seas shipping companies are increasing their freight rates and the wool sales at Brisbane probably will be postponed as a result.

The last hope for a settlement will come today when the strikers' conference will consider the terms offered by the men by the mine owners.

Prices are rapidly rising and coal is selling at \$18 a ton. Mr. Bowdler, the president of the miners' general convention, has advised the strikers. If they are hungry, to take what they want.

HIT BY AN AUTO.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—Albert Smith, a 14-year-old boy, residing on Britain street, was knocked down and run over tonight by an automobile driven by its owner, G. W. Thompson.

The accident occurred at the corner of Queen and Jarvis streets. The lad while at play, stepped off the sidewalk directly in front of the auto.

He was rushed in the auto to St. Michael's Hospital, where it was found he had sustained a fractured skull and several broken ribs.

B. C. MINISTRY BLAMED FOR CRIPPLED COURT

The Dominion Government Not Responsible for Delay in Appointments.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, minister of justice, replying to a question of Mr. Borden, said the appointments to the recently constituted British Columbia Court of Appeal would not be made for some time yet.

Mr. Borden made a pretense that the delay was due to election campaigns in British Columbia, charging that the Government was waiting to make appointments for their own, should the province go Liberal.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth explained that the provincial statute had been assented to on April 25, 1907, and as the Dominion Parliament had prorogued two days later, the announcement of the institution of the court did not reach Ottawa in time to deal with it. In 1908 the Federal Parliament passed legislation providing for the salaries. If there had been any crying need for action he would have supposed that most of the members of the administration of justice in British Columbia would have acted with promptness. The attorney-general of British Columbia had been in Ottawa last spring and had said to him that the proclamation would be made on the following day. He was in Ottawa four weeks after that, but had heard nothing, for nothing was done.

His own responsibility for delay counted from four weeks ago, when he returned to Canada, and found that the proclamation had been made on Sept. 1, and that the first meeting of the court of appeal was to take place on Nov. 2. He had received a telegram from the attorney-general of British Columbia pointing this out. However, he was not ready to make recommendations to the ministers, and he had replied accordingly. To this he had received no answer. He purposed still to delay a little longer until he was able to make all the appointments at once.

Hon. George E. Foster has given notice of a series of resolutions. The first declares the prevailing system of party patronage a menace to honest and efficient Government, and calls for its elimination.

The second is for correspondence relating to the presence of American warships on the Great Lakes.

The third calls for information relating to the formation and work of the secretariat decided upon by the Imperial conference of 1907.

The fourth proposes to invite the co-operation of the British authorities in devising a practical and systematic plan for the selection, preparation and distribution of British immigrants.

E. N. Lewis, M. P. for West Huron, intends to again introduce his bills regarding the saving of daylight and respecting load lines on ships. The daylight saving bill was amended and reported by a select committee, to which it was referred last year.

FODDER CROP YIELD

Potatoes, Turnips, Hay and Clover All Show Increases.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—The census office gives out a statement on the root, seed and fodder crops of Canada for the month of October.

The yield of potatoes is 99,087,000 bushels, which is 22,697,000 bushels more than last year. Turnips are reported at 107,724,000 bushels, being 5,400,000 more than last year. The hay and clover crops are 427,000 tons more than last year, its total yield being 11,877,000 tons. Fodder corn shows a decrease of 149,000 tons, the crop being 2,784,000 tons.

The average condition of potatoes over Canada is 93.98 per cent, of turnips and other roots 91.64 per cent, of hay and clover 78.88 per cent, and of fodder corn 90.68 per cent.

The value of the four crops is \$292,473,700, as against \$186,705,000 last year.

The value of hay and clover alone is \$122,287,000, being \$19,402,000 more than last year.

The potato rot has done much harm in the Maritime Provinces as a consequence of the late rains, but in Quebec and Ontario the yield is quality rank high. Good reports are also made for the Northwest Provinces, but considerable damage has been done there in places by early frost in September.

In British Columbia all the crops are reported as excellent in quality and yield.

FROM TUNNEL TOWN

Mr. Pardee Takes Over His Duties of Chief Liberal Whip.

Sarnia, Nov. 12.—Mr. F. E. Pardee, M. P., announced his duties as Liberal whip at the opening of the Commons at Ottawa.

The mortgage on the property of the Central Methodist Church was reduced by Sarnia City School Board.

Mrs. E. H. Cheney, of Chicago, who is the central figure in the sensational elopement case in that city, is a former Port Huron girl, Miss Northwick, as her name was in her marriage.

About 25 delegates to the Epworth League and Sunday School Convention were present at the meeting in the Central Methodist Church.

This is the largest convention ever held in Sarnia. A large number of miles around were represented.

The ladies of the Sarnia Golf Club held a military euchre at home in the town hall this evening. The proceeds will be devoted toward the building of the new clubhouse at the links.

PILGRIMS AND TORONTO.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—President Parsons, of the T. and D. Association, the touring Europe, today closed with the touring Europe, today closed with a game against a picked Toronto team here on Wednesday, Nov. 17. The local body felt that a \$400 guarantee was not a bad thing to stand, but the fact is a few dollars more to play for 65 per cent of the gate.

BEEKEEPERS' CONVENTION.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—At the final session of the convention of the Beekeepers' Association of Ontario, held yesterday, officers were elected for next year as follows: President, Wm. Connelley, Streetsville, re-elected; first vice-president, W. J. Craig, Bramford, re-elected; second vice-president, W. A. Chrysler, Chatham; secretary-treasurer, P. W. Hodgett, department of agriculture, Toronto, re-elected.

CHARGES CONSPIRACY TO OBTAIN FORTUNE

Says Wife and Brother Had Him Declared Insane.

London, Nov. 12.—Delphin Michael Delmas, of San Francisco, the attorney for Harry Thaw in his first trial for the murder of Stanford White, is here in connection with a divorce case in which Walter A. McCreery, his English wife, and his brother, Richard McCreery, figure. Walter is now in California, where, under the advice of Mr. Delmas, he will institute divorce proceedings against his wife. His suit will be based on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment, and he will ask for the custody of the four children.

Mr. Delmas seeks to obtain the discharge of the receiver appointed by the English court after two doctors had certified that McCreery was of unsound mind. The case is based on the contention that Walter McCreery's wife and brother conspired to secure his commitment as a lunatic in order to be able to control his present fortune and his future inheritance.

Mr. McCreery married Emilia McAdam in 1896 in England. Upon his return from a trip to California, he had a serious quarrel with his wife, and in March of this year an order was obtained for his confinement. McCreery was never heard from since, and his family was not on his terms. Accompanied by a valet and his medical attendant he went to Little Hampton and enjoyed more or less liberty. Tiring, however, of the semi-restriction at Little Hampton he went to Brussels, where he evaded an attempt which was made to induce him to return. Finding, however, according to the story told by his lawyers, that his family was not on his terms, he sailed for New York where he put his case in the hands of Mr. Delmas.

Mr. Delmas says it is ridiculous to say that McCreery is insane. A conference between the American and English lawyers may result in an amicable arrangement in reference to the custody of the children and other points at issue.

The lawyers for both parties conferred today, but no definite arrangement was made. They will meet again Nov. 10. The receivership motion will come up in the court here on Nov. 11.

LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

Bishop Sweeney Elected President at Annual Convention.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—Right Rev. Dr. Sweeney, Bishop of Toronto, was this morning elected president of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance at the annual meeting which opened at the Central Y. M. C. A.

The other officers elected were: Mr. J. K. MacDonald, Dr. A. Carman, Dr. D. Right Rev. W. L. Mills, D. D., Chancellor McKay, Rev. Dr. L. N. Tucker, Rev. S. D. Chown, Hon. J. M. Gibson, and Mrs. Gordon Wright. Vice-presidents, Rev. W. J. Hanna, secretary, Rev. T. Albert Moore, the general secretary, and Mr. Charles Copp, treasurer.

The annual report commented upon the growth of the Lord's Day movement, and the success attending the efforts of the alliance to check Sunday lawlessness.

Cobalt, it was stated, had become a law-abiding town so far as the Lord's Day act was concerned.

The report of the provincial treasurer showed contributions amounting to \$6,867.26 had been received. There was a small overplus of \$51.61.

COBALT WANTS HELP.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—A denunciation from Cobalt, "the Silver City," this morning asked the Government to bear part at least of the expense of closing up the town as ordered by the provincial department of health during the recent typhoid epidemic. The mayor headed the denunciation which was introduced by R. T. Shillington, M. P. P. The minister interviewed Hon. Mr. Hanna, provincial secretary, in whose department is the board of health, who made the usual promise of consideration.
