

He was barred from the holy communion in his parish church by the rector, Canon Thompson. Banister's first step was to take action in the ecclesiastical court known as the court of arches. There Sir Lewis Dibdin, dean of the arches, decided Canon Thompson next applied to the court of King's bench for a prohibition to stop the proceedings in the ecclesiastical court on the ground that Sir Lewis Bibdin had improperly construed the law. The King's also decided against Canon Thompson, one of the three judges support The canon then appealed and the court of appeals has now unanimously affirmed the decision of the majority of the court below.


