THE LAYMEN'S MOVEMENT REACHES NEW YORKERS

Expected That Millions Will Be Raised There for Foreign Work.

New York, Jan. 9.—By strides the Laymen's Missionary Movement is advancing upon New York. It is a campaign for greater interest in foreign missions. No money is received; missionaries are sent out. The work is "educational and inspirational, not administrative," and the effect is to arouse laymen to work through their churches. Churches, women are not admitted. Such men are interested in J. Pierpont Morgan and Everett P. Wheeler, of Harvard.

The activities in Greater New York are part of a national campaign. During the winter and spring, 75 conventions in all will be held. There have been 120 church members registered. In Toronto there has been an increase from \$170,000 to \$370,000. Similar increase is hoped for here.

Last year the 128,479 church members of Brooklyn spent \$1,733,000 on their own churches, and gave \$238,000 to home missions, and \$129,000 to foreign missions. The figures for Manhattan have not yet been given out.

A great mass meeting is to be held at the Hippodrome a week from today as the climax of the campaign.

\$20,000 FIRE AT AMHERSTBURG

Hotel, Residence and Poolroom Destroyed—Other Buildings Damaged.

Amherstburg, Ont., Jan. 10.—Fire early yesterday morning burned three buildings to the ground, damaged two others, and entailed a loss of property valued at \$20,000. The Anglo-American Hotel was totally destroyed, and the guests had to escape clad only in their night-clothes.

The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is thought to be from a gas-heated stove. It started between the hotel and a building on the north side of it, which is used by Jere Mailoux, the proprietor of the hotel, as a bowling alley and poolroom. Charles Harris, a grocer, saw the rear of the bowling alley ablaze at about 4 o'clock and turned in the alarm.

When the fire department arrived 20 minutes later the rear of the hotel was also in flames, a residence on the other side of the bowling alley, also the property of Mailoux, had taken fire, and a residence in the rear of the hotel facing Richmond street, said to belong to Mrs. Louis Lemay, of Detroit, was beginning to burn. Smoke began to pour from a blacksmith shop.

The proprietor was awakened by the cry of his baby. He called his wife and children and they escaped after hastily giving the alarm to the guests, about fifteen in number.

HARMONY THROWN TO THE WILDS

ling considered, the question of a new Grand Trunk station will, I believe, be involved with them, and consequently I would suggest that the strongest and most earnest efforts be made to bring about, if at all possible, the erection of a union station for all railways entering the city.

LONDON AND PORT STANLEY RAILWAY.

In view of the Niagara power question, and the falling off of the share of the receipts of the London and Port Stanley Railway, I would suggest that steps be taken to ascertain the extent of the probable cost of electrifying the road.

ELECTRIC RADIAL RAILWAYS.

As charters have been granted to several companies for electric railways, leading from London to large, growing and fertile portions of the province, I would suggest for your careful consideration the advisability of offering every facility and encouragement to them, not only to enter the city, but to connect with the city, for I firmly believe that the more railways of this description which we can get to enter the city the better it will be for the city and for the Niagara power scheme which we have undertaken.

PUBLIC AND HIGH SCHOOL RATES.

The public school rate has during the past ten years increased 90 per cent, and during the past twenty years 268 per cent. The rate for the city during the past ten years has increased 59 per cent, and during the past twenty years 402 per cent, while during the same ten years the expenditure of the city for all purposes other than schools, has increased only 42 per cent, and during the same twenty years only 216 per cent. In view of these, in my opinion, startling facts, and considering the fact that the board of education has, for some years, taken up nearly all the increased revenue from growth of population and consequent increased assessment, and that the city council is bound by law to provide for the board of education all the money which they demand, so long as their demands are within the powers conferred upon them by law, I would suggest that you consider whether or not the time has arrived when the Legislature should be requested, either to grant to the council the power to regulate, and if that is not advisable, to reduce the estimates of the board of education, or to oblige them to levy and collect their own rates from the ratepayers, at whose hands they have to seek election.

REGISTRY OFFICE.

The question of either a new registry office or enlargement of the present one, is a pressing one. For a long time past the existing one has, in my opinion, been utterly inadequate for the public needs, and anything that would be of any advantage to the public space, and there is not sufficient accommodation for persons having to transact business there. I therefore suggest for your consideration that the present building and site be sold, the fish market (which is not a paying investment) be pulled down, and a registry office erected on King street, where the fish market now stands. It is my belief that the proceeds of the sale of the present registry office property would go a long way toward the cost of a new building, and would suggest to the members of the No. 1 committee visit the registry office and see the state of things as they now exist.

MARKET EXTENSION.

The enlargement of the market is desirable, but as it would require the expenditure of a large amount of money in order to purchase the requisite land, and thereby the already heavy debt of the city would be much increased, I do not recommend it at present. However, I think

CLINGING TO ROCK FOR TWENTY HOURS

Crew of Wrecked Ship Finally Rescued in Hurricane on Atlantic.

Bristol, Jan. 10.—The terrible experience of a shipwrecked crew whose vessel was lost during the recent hurricane in the Atlantic are being related at Bristol, where the West India mail steamer Port Kingston arrived with the men on board. The wreck occurred off the coast of Jamaica.

The members of the crew were rescued in a remarkable manner. After their ship, the Athens, a Glasgow sailing vessel, lying the Norwegian flag, had broken up, nine of them clinging to a rock which stood only four feet out of the water and which was only four feet in length. It was three and a half miles from an island which is only inhabited for three months during the year, and on which there was no food had they been able to reach it.

As they clung to the rock the gale continued at its height, and the seas washed high over them. To make matters worse, one of their number was helpless, owing to having had his leg cut open.

At 10 p.m. for 20 hours they clung to their only hope, two of them holding the helpless man up their shoulders. And then some fishermen, at the risk of their lives, went to their rescue, and brought them off in safety.

The rescue of the crew was a wonderful episode. Had the two bundles of wood under their arms in order that he might float, but he was the plaything of the waves, which tossed him between two pillars of rock, where he became jammed.

There seemed no possibility of food, but subsequently he had the good fortune to pick up six cases of prepared oatmeal, a tin of mustard and a cask of water, which had floated from the wreck. He lived on the oatmeal, mustard and water for six days, at the end of which time, he, too, was sighted and saved.

SERIOUS STRIKE RIOT AT SYDNEY MINES

Two Men Wounded in Clash Between the Pickets and Police.

Halifax, Jan. 10.—Another clash between the Coal Company police and the men on strike at Dominion No. 6 colliery occurred Saturday morning. The colliery had not been working for some months, but was reopened a few days ago. Reports of the actual cause of the disturbance are most conflicting, and it is difficult to secure any definite particulars of the affair.

As far as can be learned about 50 of the strikers were on picket duty at the colliery Sunday morning. At daylight, when the new men arrived to go to work, a squad of the company's police went with them, and as they were passing through the United Mine Workers' men, who were standing on the road, the police ordered the latter to move away. The strikers were annoyed by the actions of the police, who showed them about, and used threatening language toward the police, and endeavored to assault the officers.

Many of the pickets were armed with shotguns, sticks, revolvers, stones, etc., and appeared most threatening. Shots were exchanged between the police, and the strikers. No fatalities resulted, but an Italian named Duranto received a bullet in the arm, and another man named Milloy had his face marked by a charge of small shot. The police made ten arrests, five on charges of unlawful assembly, and five on charges of carrying concealed weapons. They will be tried this week.

MAY WED WIFE'S SISTER

London Courts So Decide Against the Church of England.

London, Jan. 10.—The Church of England has fought a great fight against the legalization of marriage with a deceased wife's sister as far as the court of appeals, and an appeal to the House of Lords is still possible, but in the meantime the course of this historic case has run as follows:

A man by the name of Banister married his deceased wife's sister in circumstances which the recent act legalized. He was barred from the holy communion in his parish church by the rector, Canon Thompson. Banister's first step was to take action in the ecclesiastical court known as the court of archdeacons. There Sir Lewis Diddin, dean of the archdeacons, decided against Canon Thompson.

Canon Thompson next applied to the court of King's Bench for a prohibition to stop the proceedings in the ecclesiastical court. The court decided that Sir Lewis Diddin had improperly construed the law. The King's Bench also decided against Canon Thompson.

Canon Thompson then appealed to the court of appeals. The court of appeals has now unanimously affirmed the decision of the majority of the court below.

GREAT FLOODS IN HOLY MECCA

Constantinople, Jan. 10.—A large part of the city of Mecca has been flooded, including Mahomet's sanctuary. Eight persons have been drowned.

THE COMET'S IN SIGHT

Look for it in the Western Sky in the Early Evening.

[Associated Press.] Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 10.—A straight and slender tail has been discovered behind the nucleus of Halley's comet, according to a dispatch received at the Harvard Observatory today from Professor E. F. Frost, of the Yerkes Observatory. The tail is a faint one, as yet about ten miles in length, and has an angle of 65 degrees.

Halley's comet may now be seen through small telescopes like faint nebulae. The tail, however, is too faint to be caught by anything except a highly-sensitized photographic plate. The comet is in the southern sky in the early evening, but later in the week the moon probably will become too bright to permit a sight of the celestial visitor.
