Fancy-Work Stitches

A conventional figure that is easily adapted is an oval composed of four rows of dots, the largest on the outside. This design may hhave the dots worked in slightly-padded satin stitch, or for more open effect eyelets can be used. A bold border could have three rows of the ovals, the outer walls measuring an inch and a half by an inch and a quarter, the next an inch y three-quarters, and the inner ones half an inch by three-eighths. size of the dots is proportioned to the size of the oval
