### A BYLAW

To prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the Municipality of the Township of Delaware.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Delaware hereby enacts as follows:

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or piace of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or piace other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Township of Delaware will be taken on this bylaw by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named on Monday, the 6th day of January, 1913, commencing at 9 o'clock in the morning, and continuing until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, at the undermentioned places:
