A BIG SHOWING**

More Than Two Hundred Men
Will Attend the Camp
at Goderich.

A THREE DAYS' OUTING

Boys of the Work Corps Will Be Allowed To Leave For The Trip By Their Employers of the City.

From present indications the Seventh Regiment will take more than 200 men to camp at Goderich on June 23. This is practically 50 per cent of the enrollment, which is a much better showing than was made at Toronto, for any of the eastern cities.

Lieut.-Col. Campbell, the commanding officer, has been greatly pleased by the hearty response from some of the employers of labor in the city. The McClary Manufacturing Company, the Grand Trunk car shops, and the Spring Bag and Mattress Company have all written him, stating that wherever possible, members of the regiment will be given leave of absence to enable them to attend camp. This will greatly facilitate the recruiting and help the Seventh Regiment to make a good showing at Goderich.

There was a large attendance at drill on Monday night. The men paraded practically in full strength. Company drill occupied the most of the evening.

It was decided to hold a church parade on Sunday, June 16. The officers and men will go to the First Presbyterian Church, where Rev. J. Gibson Inkster will preach the sermon.

The Cockburn memorial, erected by the Regimental Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire, will be unveiled on Monday evening, June 17. On that evening the regiment will parade for the last time before going to camp, and it is expected that a large attendance of the men will be on hand, not only for the parade, but for the unveiling.

Capt. Spittal will be range officer for Saturday next.

**INQUEST TO BE HELD

William Palmer Was Found

**HURON COLLEGE ALUMNI
ELECT THEIR OFFICERS**

Annual Meeting Held On Monday Night—A Toast to Missionaries.

The annual meeting of the Alumni Association of Huron College was held on Monday night in the dining room of the college. After the banquet had been disposed of, the president, Rev. A. E. Applegate, proposed the health of the King. This being drunk, he then proposed a toast to the "Huron College Missionaries and Their Work."

This was responded to by Rev. H. Palmer Westgate, of St. Thomas, in a pointed and lucid address. He outlined the work being done by Huron graduates in the missionary dioceses in the Canadian West, dealing particularly with the work of Revs. Fuller, Simpson and Hutton, of Algoma, the work of nine or ten men in the Calgary diocese, and others in the Westminster, Mackenzie River, and other dioceses, together with the efforts of Revs. Blackwell and C. C. Flett in the Yukon. In the foreign field, Mr. Westgate spoke of the labors of Rev. T. B. Westgate in German East Africa, and Rev. E. W. Crawford in British East Africa, and Rev. N. L. Ward, M. A., in Honan, China.

The association passed a resolution of sympathy to Mrs. G. H. Elliott, of Tyronnel, and Mrs. J. M. Gagne, of Wyoming, on their recent bereavements.

The secretary, Rev. Mr. Westgate, was instructed to send the greetings of the association to the graduates of Huron College in the foreign fields.

The committee will take into consideration in next year's programme the jubilee fund for the Western University.

There was a large attendance of the members of the association present, and the keenest interest was taken in the proceedings.

**DINED OFFICERS OF
ARMY MEDICAL CORPS**

Dr. Reason and London Medical Association Hosts of Pleasant Affair.

Dr. Clifford Reason and the members of the London Medical Association entertained the officers of the Army Medical Training Camp at Port Stanley on Saturday evening. A special car was chartered for the occasion, and conveyed the party, which numbered about 60, to the hotel, where supper was served at 7 o'clock. Dr. Clifford Reason, as president of the association, presided. Following the dinner, a number of toasts were given and some able responses made. The toast to the Dominion of Canada was responded to by Col. Hodgins and Col. Fotheringham. Col. Hodgins spoke along the lines of the vast opportunities that are to be found in Canada, while Col. Fotheringham dealt with the responsibilities that these opportunities create. Both addresses were interesting and instructive, and were enjoyed immensely. Major Drum related his experiences in South Africa during the Boer war, dealing with the terrible ravages of enteric fever and the means taken to combat it. Col. Jones, commander of the army training camp, and director-general of the medical service in the Canadian militia, spoke of the excellent service of the Army Medical Corps, which had its uses and its benefits not only in times of war, but in times of peace.

Several members of the London Medical Association spoke briefly, among them being Drs. H. A. McCallum and McWilliam.

FRITCH STILL IN JAIL

Security Offered For the Physician Was Not Adequate.

Detroit, June 11.—Dr. George A. Fitch, convicted slayer of Maybelle Millman, of Ann Arbor, who was recently granted a new trial by the supreme court, did not get out of jail yesterday afternoon, because neither Judge Phelan nor Assistant Prosecutor Jasnowski was satisfied with the two bondsmen that Attorneys Frank T. Lodge and Wm. Brown offered as security for the \$10,000 bond. The inquiry into the qualifications of the two men who were offered—Jacob Summers, of 14 Canfield avenue east, and John W. Lathrup, a Greenwich Township farmer—was not concluded, and he will be resumed this morning at ten o'clock.

**TORONTO MAN SUICIDES
IN SOUTHERN CITY**

Shoots Himself on a Street at Mobile, Alabama.

Mobile, Alabama, June 10.—An unknown white man shot himself through the brain between 12 and 1 o'clock this afternoon, in the rear of the theatre at Monroe Park, death resulting instantly. The body was found by one of the park employees who went to inquire as to the cause of the shot.

Dr. H. P. Hirschfeld, the coroner, made an investigation and declared it a suicide.

The man was attired in a suit of clothes with greenish stripes, wore a black hat, was evidently between 35 and 40 years of age, weighs about 145 pounds, and is about 5 feet 10 inches in height.

In a pocketbook found in his clothing was the sum of \$5. The pistol which he used to kill himself was a 38-calibre revolver, which was found in his right hand.

A paper found in an inside pocket of his coat bore the name of G. W. Read, of Toronto, Canada. Inquiry at all the hotels failed to find anyone registered under that name.

The body is now in the custody of the city sexton.

DR. VERRINDER DEAD

Prominent Musician Passed Away on Monday.

Dr. Carl Verrinder, for many years one of London's most prominent musicians, who was formerly organist at the old Queen's Avenue Methodist Church, and later of St. Peter's Cathedral, succumbed to a three-weeks' illness at St. Joseph's Hospital yesterday.

Dr. Verrinder, who was born in Germany, removed when quite young to England with his parents, and graduated from Cambridge University. Some months afterward he came to London, and for several years conducted a conservatory on Queen's Avenue. At different times during the past twenty years he had lived in Chatham, Thamesville and Ridgeway, returning to London three years ago. Since then he had made his residence on Oxford street, and of late at 553 Central avenue. His wife and one daughter, Mrs. McNeil, survive him.
