Caroline Coe's Letter to a Young Housewife

Dearest—You will remember you had two extra pretty shells from your camping dinner. You can use the two extra shells for dinner the next night. Fill with mushrooms in a cream sauce. Use two even tablespoons of flour and one even tablespoon of butter or its substitute. Blend perfectly smooth. Heat one and one-half cups of milk in double boiler (if you haven't one, use a little pan and set it in the skillet, putting two or three nails under the pan).

When the milk is warm, put a little into the flour and butter, and stir until the consistency of cream. Turn into hot milk, and stir so as to keep from being lumpy. Allow to cook slowly at least half an hour. When ready to serve, salt to taste. Put in the mushrooms, and serve in the patty or pie shells. Try to make your work as easy as possible, and don't fuss too much for Billie, for he must know that lots to eat costs money, makes work, and a whole lot of dishes to wash. Does he help with them? Make him—let him teach him to invite you out once in a while to dinner, so he won't have to wash the dishes.

By the way: How do you wash your dishes? Always have plenty of hot water. I like to wash my pots and kitchen things first, getting the worst out of the way. After that, washing the silver, glass and china dishes does not seem anything more than being some dainty fancy work.

COLOR IN TABLE LINEN AND DECORATIONS.

I saw an inviting and attractive table recently which was a little unusual because of the color that appeared in it.

The cloth was a pretty white damask, having a broad black line design in blue of a delicious shade. The centre piece was in the willow pattern—the pagoda, the residence, the bridge over the river, with the irate parents in pursuit of the runaway lovers, the turtle doves, etc., all worked out in two shades of the same blue as that in the tablecloth. A clear crystal bowl held a beautiful bouquet of corn-flowers, their green stems and foliage showing through the glass.

The serviettes were marked in blue with the family initial, and the tea-cosy had the romantic willow pattern story wrought out in detail. The china was, of course, the willow pattern, and the blue and white with the sheet of the silver, made up a very charming color scheme in a yellow room that looked out upon blue mountains, and gorgeously colored trees.

This idea of introducing color into the table linen for breakfast or luncheon is a really pretty one, and for late supper it is most effectively done. At a Christmas supper last year much red was used to make the table gay and festive. The hostess used creamy white damask, having red bands for cloth, the serviettes were red-banded and initialled, and the centre piece was composed of clusters of pine needles that were a reasonable background for bunches of

rowan berries, whose weight was supported on unpeeled sticks, and the six candles were covered by red shades.

ABOUT BUTTONS

The distinguishing characteristic of the new button is the pronounced representation given to odd shapes, many of which are evidently of cubist inspiration, say The Dry Goods Economist.

Among the most striking novelties are the crystals with mosaic designs in Chinese colorings. These unusual effects are accomplished by means of carving and by painting the designs underneath the crystal.

Many dainty floral designs, accomplished in like manner, are shown, some of which are tersely given the title "hot-house" buttons.

Chinese novelties in colorings typical of Chinese embroideries are the acme of smartness. In many of the best of these novelties rich burnt orange tones predominate. Some of them resemble Chinese lanterns. Black glass or crystal is much favored as the background for these brilliant Chinese effects.

The Chinese colorings are even more strikingly emphasized in the semi-ball buttons, some of which are half one color and half another; while others are divided into as many as five distinct colors, each of which is in a different color.

Among the extremely new effects are the fruit buttons in realistic shapes and colorings.

Buttons and wires were formerly made by hand, the wires being bent into proper shape with small pliers.
