ALONG THE MAIN ROAD

Successful Trench Raids Carried Out at Neuve Chapelle.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Oct. 21, 12:28 p.m.—The British on the Somme front have made additional headway in their push towards Bapaume, along the main road from Albert, according to today's announcement by the war office, which records a gain of ground near Butte de Warlencourt. The statement reads:

"During the night further progress was made in the neighborhood of Butte de Warlencourt. There was intermittent shelling by the enemy on our front north and south of the Ancre.

"We successfully raided enemy trenches south of Neuve Chapelle."

THE FRENCH REPORT.

Paris, Oct. 21.—The official communication issued this afternoon at the French headquarters says:

"There was nothing of importance during the night to report.

"Aviation: Yesterday our chasing aeroplanes had numerous combats in the course of which seven enemy machines fell. Three of them without our lines. These fell between Bouvignes and Rancourt. The four others dropped in the region of Molains and Brie."

CANADIAN FLIERS MAY
TRAIN IN WEST INDIES

Toronto, Oct. 21.—Flight Lieut. R. E. MacBeth of the Royal Flying Corps has just returned from the West Indies, where he was sent by Col. Merritt of the Canadian aviation staff stated that as the winter of a suitable climate for winter flying was of first-class importance, the Canadian aviation fund had been only too glad to take advantage of Mr. MacBeth's offer to visit the West Indies.

PEACE FOOTING IN GREECE
IS ORDER OF ENTENTE
AND DISORDER MUST STOP

Allies Have Threatened To Land More Troops If Turbulence Not Curbed—Evacuation of Thessaly and Army Reduced Two-Thirds Is Order.

New York, Oct. 21.—A news agency dispatch from Rome today says:

The Allies have notified the Greek Government that unless disorders are decisively put down, additional troops will be landed. This information was contained in a telegram from Athens today.

The Allies have also ordered the Greek army to be reduced two-thirds, that is, to a peace footing, and also the evacuation of Thessaly.

CHEERING SERBS
SWEEP BULGARS
FROM HEIGHTSDashing Charge of Peter's
Troops in Monastir
Drive.

ENEMY WAS PUT TO ROUT

Took to Heels When Serbs
Came to Close
Quarters.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Oct. 21.—The British press correspondent with the Serbian army gives the following description of Thursday's battle in the Monastir campaign:

"The day's fighting began at 8 o'clock in the morning. Artillery, infantry and cavalry all played their parts with unusual faithfulness to the old traditions of Vukobrat in Serbian hands by noon, and although this was as much as the staff had hoped to attain by the whole operation, the Serbs kept on. The capture of Brod followed immediately, and by night the new Serbian line included Gardar with the cavalry still further in front.

Charged with Cheers.

"At the beginning of the day's fighting every advantage rested with the Bulgarians. They held the higher line beyond the river, with slopes so steep that they could roll rocks down on the attackers. There was a shower of artillery preparation from 5 to 10 o'clock. Then suddenly a great cheer went up, and at 10 the Serbian infantry began their advance. They moved by regiments from a great distance, as every man had a big square of white calico fastened to the back of his blue coat, and the leading men carried white and red flags with which to make the first point reached, so that the artillery could see and avoid shelling them.

"While the Serbian infantry advanced one crest the artillery began pounding the crest just beyond, and soon little white flags began to mark the Serbian advance. At that point, then, the cheering broke out with redoubled force as far beyond the white flags the observers could see dark figures running fast downhill. They were Bulgarians in flight."

THE DIARY OF MARS

Notable headway is being made by the Serbs on the Macedonian front in their campaign for Monastir, according to the current reports from Entente sources.

Paris today announces further gains against the Bulgarians in the bend of the Cerna, southeast of Monastir, where the Serbs have pushed well to the north of the river, following their recent passage at Brod.

Unofficial advices also report the Serbs, assisted by French troops, attacking the Kerat in that point, then the cheering broke out with redoubled force as far beyond the white flags the observers could see dark figures running fast downhill. They were Bulgarians in flight."

Kenali is less than 10 miles from Monastir. The Bulgarian position here is declared by Entente military commentators to be virtually outflanked by the Serbian capture of Velselo in the Cerna sector, six miles northeast of Kenali.

The latest Bulgarian and German official statements reported the Serbs checked in their Cerna Valley campaign.

On the Somme front, in Northern France, Gen. Haig's forces are again scoring gains in their push toward Bapaume, London announces. A new British advance near Butte de Waren is reported.

MADE GRAND ADMIRAL.

Amsterdam, Oct. 21.—Via London.—A Vienna telegram says that Emperor Francis Joseph has appointed Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of Emperor William, a grand admiral of the Austrian navy, an honorary title.

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT
SEIZES THE CORNERED EGGS

Rome, Oct. 20.—Via Paris, Oct. 21.—The municipal authorities at Milan have seized 100 cars containing 15,000,000 eggs, as the result of a campaign to prevent speculation. Milan, Rome and other centres have been eggless for the last week, notwithstanding the existence of immense stocks. It is expected that the Government will fix a uniform price of three cents throughout Italy, and seize and sell all eggs at this price.

DRIVE AT RUMANIA
ENEMY'S LAST CARD,
STATES TIMES MANChecked on All Fronts, Teuton Forces Cannot Get Through
To Crush Rumania—Crisis Not Over, But Ferdinand's Troops Have Crippled Gen. Von Falkenhayn's Offensive.

London, Oct. 21.—Von Falkenhayn's offensive against the Rumanians in Transylvania proved to be Germany's last card, says the Times correspondent in Bucharest under Tuesday's date. If, after being checked on all other fronts, they are repulsed here their whole game can be considered as hopeless.

"Still, it cannot be assumed that the crisis is permanently passed," he continues, "although the Rumanians now hold the pass among the mountains and the enemy is being rolled down on them from the mountains barrels of slime. The Germans and Austrians have twelve to fourteen divisions on the Transylvania front, and probably will continue sending reinforcements as long as the weather permits operations in this mountainous region.

German Losses Heavy.

"More than a fortnight has passed

since the Rumanians had to withdraw before this strong force, and the enemy has not attained his aim. The Carpathians have dug the tomb of thousands of the enemy, and the impetuous attacks of the Bavarian highlanders have been repulsed with enormous losses.

"At some points the enemy has penetrated the border, but has got no further. Near Rucari, where the Teutons were six miles within Rumania, the Rumanians have taken a strong defensive line, and are now holding their own. At some points they have taken the offensive, as at the Oltoz Pass, where the enemy has been repulsed over the frontier. Also in the Buzau valley the Rumanians are again attacking.

"Wherever the Rumanians are resisting strong attacks and are counter-attacking steadily. At many points positions are changing hands several times daily."

FOUR KILLED NEAR DELHI
WHEN EXPRESS HITS MOTOR

VON MACKENSEN GETS CONSTANTINE'S ACTS
VILLAGE IN RUMANIA, TAKE A GRAND PRIZE
ELSEWHERE REPULSED FROM GREEK NATION

(Canadian Press.)

Petrograd, Oct. 21.—Via London, 1:52 p.m.—An attack on the Russo-Rumanian front in Dobruja by Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces yesterday resulted in the loss to the defenders of the village of Kojakia, the war office announced today. Later attacks on the Entente lines in the same region were repulsed.

The repulse of the Teutonic attack in the Narayuvka district, southwest of Lemberg, in Galicia, is announced by the war office in today's official statement. In Volynia, only artillery engagements and outpost operations are reported. The statement adds:

"In the Ulanovsk and Alexandrovsk settlements, eight versts (about five miles), north of Kisel (22 miles east of Vladimir-Volynsk in Volynia), an artillery battle is proceeding.

"In the region of Shelov and west of Bubnov active reconnaissance have been carried out by the main force of the army."

Today's war office statement regarding operations on the eastern and Caucasian fronts says:

"An enemy attack on the Barrov farm near the Narayuvka (in Galicia, southeast of Lemberg), two versts (about 11-14 miles), south of the village of Svitelnik, was repulsed by our fire.

"In the wooded Carpathians snow is falling and has reached in the ravines a depth as great as four feet eight inches."

"South of Dorna Watra (near the Rumanian border), the enemy attacked one of our advanced posts. Supported by 100 machine guns the post repulsed the attack and put the enemy to flight, capturing one machine gun, a trench mortar and a number of prisoners.

"Caucasus front: No events of importance have occurred."

TOOK 3,000 RUSSIANS.

Berlin, Oct. 21.—Via London, 4:15 p.m.—German troops have forced their way into several points of the main line of the Russians in the Dobruja region, south of Ruchova, on the Danube in Dobruja. The troops of the Central Powers captured the Black Sea town of Tuzla after the heights northwest of Topal Sars and the heights northwest of Tulcevo. Some 3,000 Russians have been captured by the Teuton and Bulgarian forces, and 22 machine guns were taken. The foregoing was announced in the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters.

TUG SHAUN RHUE SAFE

Aged Captain Pilots His Boat
Safely Into Kingsville
Harbor.

Cleveland, Oct. 21.—The Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company's office here today received a wireless message from the captain of its passenger steamer Western Star, which left Detroit for Cleveland this morning, that he was standing by the wreck of a barge off Bar Point, and that six of the crew were drowned, one had been rescued and one was still in the rigging. The barge is said to be the D. L. Fisher, but marine directories show no barge of that name. It may be the D. L. Flier, owned by the Hines Transportation Company of Chicago.

LATER.

A later wireless message from the Western Star confirmed the name of the lost barge as the Flier, and said that of the crew of seven all were drowned excepting the captain, John Mattison. Those drowned are: Mate Herbert Logan, Sailors Oscar Johnson, Christ Burree, Hawkins Gottliebson, James Saunders, and Cook Nole Farnes. Mattison is on board the Western Star.

After being left by the tempest at Bar Point, the Flier dragged her anchor six miles in the storm and then foundered. The Flier was a ship of 320 tons and hailed from Michigan City, and was loaded at Buffalo with coal.

THE SHAUN RHUE SAFE.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 21.—Manned only by its aged captain and two members of its crew, the tug Shaun Rhue of Lake Erie was brought safely to Pelee Island, Ont., this forenoon. The vessel was disabled in the terrific storm on Lake Erie last night. When a tug came to the rescue early today, it is claimed that five members of the Shaun Rhue's crew left their ship and were taken aboard the rescuing tug.

Capt. Robert Maines, 75 years old, refused to leave his tug, and according to reports received here, his engineer and cook decided to stay with him. The captain steered his ship through the gale to Pelee Island, while the other tug proceeded to Kingsville, Ont.

RESCUE SHIP DELAYED.

Cleveland, Oct. 21.—The steamer J. G. Hartwell, with eleven survivors of the wrecked steamer Marshal F. Butters, which foundered yesterday afternoon off the southeast shore in Lake Erie had not arrived at Fairport Harbor, near here, today, as anticipated, and no word had come from the craft, so that there is still doubt as to whether or not there was any loss of life when the Butters went down. The Hartwell is not believed to be in any danger, but is thought to have been delayed by the gale, and is expected to make port some time today.

SOLDIERS' VOTES CHANGE
B. C. POLL RESULTS

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 21.—The soldiers' vote cast in Canada changes in three provinces has produced the result as left by the civilian vote. Premier Bowser is 45 ahead of the lowest Liberal in Vancouver; Lieut. Frank MacKenzie, Conservative, is elected in Delta; Capt. W. W. Foster, Conservative, wins the Islands from the Liberals; Jack McInnis, Socialist, has apparently defeated Hon. W. R. Ross in Port George. The soldiers' vote on prohibition is 3,347 for and 3,820 against.

RAPHAEL COLLIN READ.

Paris, Oct. 21.—Raphael Collin, artist, is dead. He was 60 years old, an officer of the Legion of Honor and a member of the Academie des Beaux Arts.

Serbian Troops Extending Gains North of the Cerna, Bulgars
Surrendering More Ground—French Advance at Same
Time, Getting To Within Ten Miles of Monastir.

(Canadian Press.)

Paris, Oct. 21, noon.—The official account of operations on the Macedonian front, issued here today, says the Serbian forces which crossed the Cerna River, thrusting back the Bulgarians and capturing several villages, are continuing the offensive and have made further progress.

Paris, Oct. 21.—The French have occupied Kenali in Macedonia on the Entente right wing, bringing the Allies' line to within ten miles of Monastir.

THE SOFIA STATEMENT.

Sofia, Oct. 21.—Via London, Oct. 21.—The repulse of all Serbian attacks in the Cerna bend is claimed in the official statement issued by the war office today. The text of the statement follows:

"Macedonian front: On both sides of the Monastir-Florina railway there was lively cannonading. Desperate fighting continued in the Cerna bend, the Serbs displaying particular obstinacy in their efforts to advance, but we repulsed all attacks by our fire and counter-attacks. Enemy attempts to advance toward the village of Tarnova and the summit of Dobrovoje failed.

"In the Moglenitsa valley there was the usual artillery fire. Nothing important occurred on the Vardar. At the foot of Mt. Belasitica, Modrain was dispersed an enemy company which was trying to entrench on the railway north of Dova Tepsa. On the Struma front there were patrol engagements and enemy artillery bombarded inhabited places, including Sere. On the Aegean coast there is nothing to report.

"Rumanian front: In the Dobruja, between the railway and the sea, intense cannonading is proceeding on both sides."

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
