COMMONS DECLINE AMENDMENT MADE BY THE SENATE

Bill Amending Patent Act To Give Relief To Patentees Introduced.

OTTAWA, May 6.—By Canadian Press.—Sir George Foster introduced a bill to amend the Patent Act in the House of Commons this afternoon. The main provision of the bill gives relief to patentees and investors who, through disturbances caused by the war have lost their patents by avoidance or through failure to manufacture, non-payment of fees or failure to acquire patents within the prescribed time. Another clause makes provision for Canada getting the benefit of the reciprocal clauses of the Nolan bill recently passed at Washington.

Third reading was given the bill amending the opium and narcotic drugs act, after an amendment had been included fixing the terms of imprisonment for offenders.

Do Not Concur in Amendment.
The House declined to concur in an amendment made by the Senate to the bill amending the judges act. The original bill provided against paying traveling expenses to judges who do not live in the cities in which they are required to sit. The Senate amendment forbade judges sitting on court of inquiry commissions or arbitrations. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, in moving non-concurrence in the Senate amendment said it opened an entirely different question. It gave no opportunity for proper discussion, although it required serious consideration.

Second and third readings were given to a bill amending the animals contagious disease act. Hon. S. F. Timine, minister of agriculture, explained that in 1918 certain sums were fixed as compensation for animals it was necessary to destroy. The act covered a period of three years and it was at present the intention to extend this period for further three years. No change was made in the amounts of compensation.

ARE MERCHANT TAILORS MANUFACTURERS?—NOW BEFORE EXCHANGE COURT
Test of Legality of Tax on Sales Being Made.
OTTAWA, May 6.—A test case, the decision in which is to determine whether or not the Government is justified in classifying merchant tailors as manufacturers and compelling them to take out a manufacturer's license and collect a two per cent tax on sales was commenced this morning before Mr. Justice Audette in the exchequer court. The case for the Government is being presented by F. D. Hogg, while T. A. Beaumont is acting for the defendants, Pedrick & Paton, Ottawa. The action is being brought under the special war revenue act to compel the defendant and all other merchant tailors who manufacture clothes for sale to the public to take out a manufacturer's license and pay a two per cent tax sales which is called for in the act. Under the act a manufacturer refusing to pay the tax is liable to a fine of \$500. The hearing is continuing this afternoon.

REPEAL OF EMERGENCY CLAUSES IN IMMIGRATION ACT MAY BE CONSIDERED

Would Eliminate Right of Deportation For Seditious Utterance Without Trial.

OTTAWA, May 6.—A bill to amend the immigration act was introduced in the House of Commons this week by Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration. The main feature of it provides for the repeal of the emergency provisions made in 1919, for the deportation without trial by the courts of persons guilty of seditious utterances. A similar bill was introduced earlier in the session by E. Lapointe (Quebec East). The inclusion of this provision in a Government measure makes it possible to deal with it at the present session, while a measure favored by private members would have very little chance of receiving attention.

PROTOCOL BILL REPORTED.
OTTAWA, May 6.—The bill to ratify the protocol for the permanent court of international justice (created under

the Aegis of the League of Nations) was reported in the House of Commons today. It will receive final reading later.

SITUATION ENCOURAGING FOR EMPLOYING PRINTERS, DECLARES JAS. C. ACTON

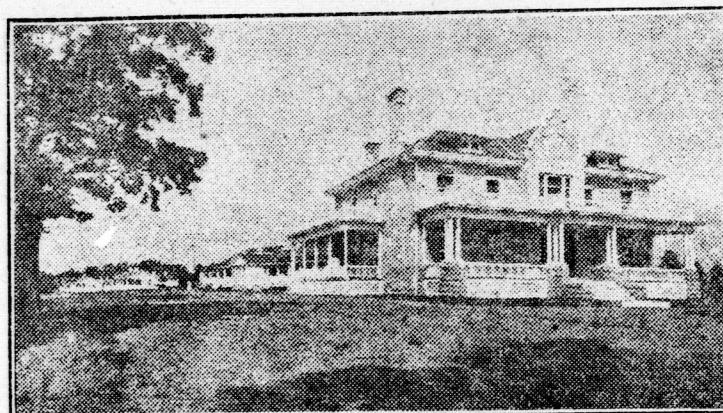
Result in Chicago Agreement a Victory For Employers, Claim.

BUFFALO, May 6.—(By Canadian Press).—James C. Acton of Toronto, district representative of the Ontario and Quebec Typographers, who has been in the United States investigating conditions regarding the printers' strike, has issued the following statement to the Canadian Press, Limited: "Twenty-two large cities, exclusive of Chicago and New York, give a total of 2,256 shops, employing 21,400 men, of which only 797 shops are affected, with 7,700 men on strike. In these pivot cities there are but 329 shops signed up for 44 hours, these shops employing but 1,589 men, indicating

that only small shops run by union men weakened. All important plants present solid fronts, large shops herebefore union now declaring for non-union shops.

Victory for Employers.
"The Chicago wage controversy, pending since February resulted in the men going back to work at \$1.55 cut in wages, in all departments. This was a decided victory for the employers," the statement goes on to say, "as the men affected were in closed shops who had agreed to 44 hours, and closed shops were competing with 216 open shops who continue to work and are running normal at 48 hours. In Buffalo the situation is very encouraging to employers. All plants are running, and after five days' strike 50 per cent of the men are at work. Baltimore printers, after arbitration, have accepted 10 per cent reduction in wages. Philadelphia messmen and feeders are at work 48 hours, and bookbinders have withdrawn demands."
