NAPLES, Aug. 4.-The funeral Enrico Caruso took place today. From the royal church of san Francesco di Paola the cortege moved through streets lined with troops and vast crowds to the cemetery, where the body was placed SOME TIME BEFORE

in a vault.

Services were held in this famous
church by permission of King Victor
Emmanuel, who sent a special representative to attend the ceremery. A great
choir composed of hundreds of singers
assisted in the high requiem mass.

In Crystal Coffin.

The crystal coffin encased in a woodan casket was borne in a hearse drawn
by six horses. There were innumerable
floral offerings, among them a wreath
from the City of New York. All places
of business had been closed as a sign
of mourning and as the great procession
passed aeroplanes flew overhead.

So dense was the throngs that the
troops had difficulty in holding the
people back. All the windows and balconies were crowded and many of them
were draped. Eulogies were pronounced
by the Prefect of Naples in the name of
the king, and the government by the
director of the conservatory and by representatives of the mayor and the artists of the city.

The body of the great singer lay on
a catafalque in the centre of the Basilica surrounded by hundreds of candles.
The catafalque, covered with black velvet and gold stood in a bower of flowers.
Took Last Look.

Before the church was opened to the
public, Mrs. Caruso, having her little
daughter Gloria by the hand, came to
view the body of her husband once
again. She placed beside it a large bunch
of roses. Others of the grief-stricken
relatives gathered in the Basilica and
looked for the last time upon the face
of the dead, which seemed to be of one
sleeping peacefully. Glovanni, brother
of Enrico, first knelt beside the coffin,
then rising, invoked Caruso to breathe
again. Rodolfo, the son, was equally
affected.

TURKS NOW IN BETTER POSITION TO MEET GREEKS

Nationalists Sustained Enormous Losses in Their Recent Retreat.

ATHENS. Aug. 4 .- After having been orced to retreat with enormous losses, the Turks now are in a better position the Turks now are in a better position to offer serious resistance to the Greek forces, according to a communication issued to the Greek newspapers, which makes this assertion after giving details of the various cperations since the offensive began. All the actions of the various units of the Greek army from the time they entered the fighting are described.

As for the future operations of the Greek army in Asia Minor, it is stated that the principal object is to vanquish the remainder of the Turkish forces, but it is denied that a Greek division

but it is denied that a Greek division is marching on Constantinople. The Greek military authorities are releasing all fugitives in the occupied zone. Greek eroplanes, the announcement says, again have bombarded Angora, the

Nationalist capital.

The Turkish statement of August 1, that the Greeks had been repulsed with heavy losses near Sivri-Hissar and that they were retreating towards Eski-Shehr, is branded as false.

LAW TO ENCOURAGE BUYING OF "MADE-IN-CANADA" GOODS

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—By Canadian Press.—Regulations governing the marking of imports with the name of the country of origin, which comes into effect on October 1, have been drafted by the department of customs and excise practically in the form which it is expected they will be made effective. In order that he may secure the views of the importers with regard to the suitability of the proposed regulations, which become necessary through amendments to the customs legislation at the last session of Parliament, the minister of customs, Hon. R. W. Wigmore, has called a round table conference of exporters from the Montreal and Toronto boards of trade, which will be held on Monday next, and at which the present draft of regulations will be laid before the exporters. It is expected that the bringing into force of the new regulations on October 1 will have a salutary effect on the movement for the use of Canadian products wherever necessary as every article imported must, under the new law, have the name of the country of origin stamped plainly on the outside wrapper. In this way Canadian purchasers will be able to see at a glance whether or not they are buying "made-in-Canada'' goods.


