DR. ROSE NOMINATED.

NELSON, B.C., Oct. 7.—At a nominating convention held here last night, Dr. W. O. Rose, M.L.A. for Nelson, was the unanimous choice of the National Liberal and Conservative party to contest the federal constituency of West Kootenay.

TWO KILLED AS TRAIN ENGINE HITS AUTO

Grimsby Man and Girl Victims of G. T. R. Flyer.

GRIMSBY, Ont., Oct. 7.—Andrew Yeager, 51 years old, and Hildreth Eckardt, 29 years old, both of Grimsby, are dead, and Lloyd Yeager, 29 years old, is lying in Hamilton Hospital in a serious condition, as a result of their automobile being struck by an east-bound Grand Trunk flyer.

The car, with Lloyd Yeager driving, was proceeding south over the level crossing, east of the town, and apparently did not hear the electric warning bell, or see the train.

The engine struck the rear end of the car on the right side, with such force that Mr. Yeager, Sr., was thrown off on the cowcatcher. His head was badly crushed and practically every bone in his body broken. He leaves one daughter besides the injured son and his widow.

Hildreth Eckardt was injured about the head and body and died almost instantly. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Eckardt, and one of famous family of Musical Eckardts.

Lloyd Yeager did not lose consciousness and was rushed to Hamilton Hospital by Dr. McLay on a westbound engine and caboose.

The engine threw the car against the crossing fence, smashing the posts off close to the ground and thence into the ditch.

The accident today brings the total number of Grimsby people killed on two level crossings here in eighteen years up to ten.

PROGRESSIVES OF MARQUETTE CHOSE CRERAR

Unanimous Support For Only Name Placed Before the Convention.

PROTECTION UNSOUND

Declares Mr. Crerar in Address At His Nomination Meeting.

SHOAL LAKE, Man., Oct. 7.—(By Canadian Press).—By unanimous vote, the Progressive convention of Marquette today chose Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the National Progressive party, as their candidate in the forthcoming federal election. Mr. Crerar was the only name submitted to the convention. Marquette is the county which elected Mr. Crerar in 1917.

Addressing the delegates to the convention and a public meeting later, Mr. Crerar took occasion to reply to some of the charges leveled against the Progressive body and against himself.

As at Brandon, a couple of days ago, he declared that the prime minister had placed no constructive policy before the people, and as at Brandon, he challenged the Government to lay bare the source of its campaign funds. Again he maintained that the tariff was an important but not the sole issue of the campaign. But here he pursued his argument further: "The prime minister," Mr. Crerar declared, "is making the welkin ring throughout the Maritime Provinces—he is ringing the charges up and down everywhere else—that if Progressives come into power, you will have free trade in the country, and everything will go to the hounds. That, of course, is a gross misrepresentation of the facts.

"My position is this, and the position of the Progressive movement, this, that the principle of protection is unsound as applied to the finance policy of this country. But I want to say this also, that for the purpose of revenue to cover the cost of a protective tariff was to keep goods out of the country, and that so far as it protected in this regard, a customs tariff did not raise any revenue.

When goods failed to enter a country they did not produce any customs revenue. Under the present tariff of 35 per cent—Mr. Crerar contended in illustration—woolen goods were practically prohibited from entry into Canada. If that rate were reduced to 17 or 15 per cent woolens would come in, revenue would be raised, the spirit of competition would be introduced into the woolen industry, and competition was the very life and breath of trade.

"Agriculture is the very foundation of our prosperity," he exclaimed. "If you are to have Canada prosperous, you must have agriculture prosperous." He cited instances of the way in which, he said, farmers were suffering under the present fiscal system. He mentioned the case of a Marquette farmer who bought a carload of cattle last fall, fed them and then had to sell them recently in Winnipeg for less than he gave for them."

EAST BRUCE P. S. TEACHERS IN SESSION

WALKERTON, Oct. 6.—The annual meeting of the East Bruce Teachers' Institute is being held in the public school here today and tomorrow. There is a good representation of teachers present.

The morning session was devoted largely to routine business. Addresses were given, one by H. Alton, principal of the Walkerton Public School, on "Practical Measures in Arithmetic," and Miss M. Wilmeyer of Warton, vice-president of the institute, on "The Teachers' Northern Trip."

The afternoon meeting was opened by an address by the president, Miss Pollock of Chesley, and four very instructive papers by Miss M. C. McGregor, B. A., of the Walkerton High School staff, on "Some Aspects of the Teaching of History," H. G. Lockett, M.A., of Hamilton, on "The Forward Movement in Education," Stanley Sanderson, principal of the Chesley school, "Music in the Public Schools," and A. E. Smith, principal of the Warton school, "Entrance Geography."

Tonight Dr. Walter Jones, the celebrated Chautauqua lecturer, is giving his famous lecture, "The Red Horizon," to a crowded house at the town hall.

OPEN SEASONS FOR HUNTING.

In Ontario the season for big game hunting is now on and from October 1 to November 30, moose, deer, or caribou can be taken north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway (formerly the Grand Trunk Pacific) from Quebec to the Manitoba boundary. In that part of Ontario south of the French and Mattawa Rivers from November 5 to November 20, and that part of Ontario lying north and west of the French and Mattawa Rivers, October 25 to November 30. There is an open season for partridge November 5 to November 20. Woodcock may be killed from September 15 to October 15, wild geese from September 1 to December 15, wild duck from September 1 to December 15. Some of the best hunting districts in Ontario are reached by the Canadian National-Grand Trunk Railways, and for further information, application should be made to agents of these lines, or write C. JURY FINDS MEHARG GUILTY OF MURDER

Return Verdict As Prisoner Collapses and Mother Sobs.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 7.—Wilfred Meharg, aged 22, was this afternoon found guilty of murdering Dr. E. J. Whitworth of Brimbrook on December 23 last, and sentence will be passed upon him by Chief Justice Mullock before the completion of the court. When the foreman of the jury announced a verdict of "guilty" Meharg fell over on his side in the prisoner's box, and tottered when being removed from the courtroom.

A distressing sight was the presence of the father and mother of the prisoner in the courtroom during the summing-up, the mother sobbing and praying for her son's life.

Makes Forceful Plea.

T. J. Agar made a forceful plea for Meharg and reminded the jury that he was only one of five connected with the fatal hold-up and the others had got off with comparatively light sentences.

The judge, addressing the jury, said it was a sad sight to see the broken-hearted parents of the prisoner in court, but society must be protected and the jurors must base their findings on the evidence and not on sympathy.

Edward Dickinson, who was acquitted of the charge of murdering Dr. Whitworth, pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of money during the hold-up in which Dr. Whitworth was shot. He will be sentenced later.

Worked on Slender Clues.

The conviction of Meharg closes one of the most tragic murder trials in the history of Hamilton. Working on the fact that two men entered the Laidman

store at Brimbrook on December 23 and shot Dr. Whitworth, who was attending to the police, with the aid of slender clues, were able to capture the two who entered the place and three others who were with them.

BELL PHONE ASKS FOR ITS INCREASE

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—The Board of Railway commissioners may now proceed with the hearing of the new application of the Bell Telephone Company for a further increase in rates.

This is the position of the matter as the result of the decision of the Government, as announced by Sir James Loughheed, that any appeal from the decision of the board on the new application must be heard in entirety before the cabinet council. An adjournment of the application before the railway commission was taken recently to have this point settled.

BURLFORD, Oct. 7.—The 28th annual exhibition of the South Brant Fair Association held here Tuesday and Wednesday was the most successful in its history. The day was clear and bright, although somewhat cool; the automobiles on the grounds were estimated at 1,500.

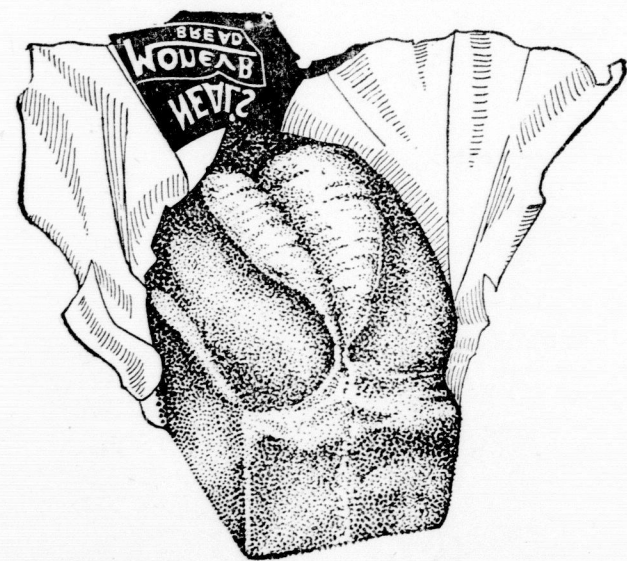
