RUSSIAN INVENTION RESULTS IN WRECK

Flat Car Driven by Airplane Propeller Runs Down Train.

BAKU, Azerbaijan, Nov. 9.—A new Russian invention for propelling railroad cars by the use of airplane propellers has just resulted in a smash-up.

Captain Simov of the Soviet Army had rigged up a flat car with a motor to drive a big airplane propeller, and built a little triangular house on the car. At a railroad junction outside of Baku, he tried to induce a conductor of a train to hitch his airplane car to the flat. The conductor refused and the train went on for about three miles and halted.

As the passengers in the rear coach were making tea, the airplane car came around a curve going about 60 m.p.h. Most of the passengers got out of the rear car by way of the windows, and the captain and a girl companion leaped from his flat car, which banged into the rear coach, doubled itself up and jumped the track, a mass of wreckage. Nobody was hurt, but the proud invention of Bolshevik land had gone to smash.

The captain said he did not see the train in time to stop, but, he added, "anyway the brake does not work."

"The Russians have been applying this airplane propeller device to push trains, automobiles and boats."

TELLS MOTHER TO USE CASTOR OIL WITH CARE

Sir Wm. Taylor, Noted Irish Surgeon, Addresses W. O. Academy of Medicine.

WARNS AGAINST DELAY

Claims Pains in Abdomen May Indicate Serious Intestinal Trouble.

Members of the Western Ontario Academy of Medicine in session here Wednesday afternoon were honored by an address delivered by Sir William Taylor, K.B.E., C.B., M.B., B.A., F.R.C.S.I., of Dublin, past president and member of the Council, Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland, who is en route to Montreal after attending the Clinical Congress at Philadelphia. Sir William selected for his topic, "Acute Intestinal Obstruction," and thoroughly covered this branch of surgery.

He urged both physicians present and the public to be ever mindful of pain in the abdomen, particularly in the case of young children, impressing upon his audience the fact that such pain unless carefully investigated may lead to serious consequences. He further emphasized the fact that mothers should not be too hasty in seeking the castor oil bottle in the pantry in an effort to relieve baby's colic, pointing out that in the onset of intestinal obstruction or appendicitis purgatives harm the patient to a marked degree.

The speaker dealt with the technical side of operation and treatment of acute intestinal obstruction, stressing the fact that the high mortality in this illness is chiefly due to delay in placing the patient in the hands of a surgeon. Operation was the only hope and that as soon as possible.

Quoting the words of one of his preceptors Sir William said at this point: "There is a time in the affairs of men, which, taken in the flood."

He reviewed several cases, which during his many years in the profession he has treated, and pointed out difficulties and pitfalls which beset his way.

He introduced the subject of chronic subintimal obstruction during his address and outlined his method of treatment.

During the discussion which followed Sir William Taylor's address, Dr. John Wishart of this city asked his opinion on the use of purgatives, and it was at this point that the distinguished visitor agreed with local surgeons in the opinion that if used at all in such surgical cases these drugs should be employed with extreme caution. Dr. Hadley Williams compared Dublin, where Sir William Taylor is a surgeon, to London.

He drew attention to the fact that in the majority of urgent surgical cases in Ireland there is a hospital near at hand for treatment, whereas in Ontario surgeons are often required to respond to a call from sparsely settled districts. Here should an operation be necessary and the patient's condition not warrant removal of several miles to hospital, the surgeon must do his best at the farm house, often under very adverse circumstances, and handicapped by meagre equipment.

In moving to a vote of thanks to the speaker, Dr. H. Williams said: "Sir William was right to the point and told more in 30 minutes than some people could do in five years." Dr. John Wishart of London seconded the vote of thanks, and voiced his appreciation of the treat accorded by Sir William's visit.

The address was delivered in the auditorium of the Western Ontario Medical School and in introducing Sir William, Dr. F. W. Hughes, president of the Western Ontario Academy of Medicine, said: "Sir William Taylor comes here with a reputation and he has engaged in surgery for a number of years. He enjoys a world-wide reputation and has come to London after attending the Congress of Surgeons at Philadelphia."

Sir William Speaks.
In his opening remarks Sir William said: "I noticed while at Philadelphia that your hospital has been recognized by the American College of Surgeons. While coming from Ireland, a doctor on the ship informed me that you had one of the best medical schools in Canada here."

Investigation of Sleeping Sickness To Take 2 1-2 Years

LONDON, Nov. 9.—An expedition formed by the Tropical Diseases Prevention Association will soon leave to make the first organized attempt to investigate on the spot the treatment of sleeping sickness, as distinct from the question of the mere transmission or cause of the disease. The expedition will be conducted by four physicians and two veterinary scientists, and it is expected the work will occupy two and a half years. It is sought to carry out the work in different centers with the sanction and support of the governments interested, and it is hoped that it will result in a general system of vaccination whereby all individuals arriving in a danger zone will be inoculated, and so gradually rendered immune.

ONE CANDIDATE WILLING TO RUN

No overwhelming ambition to sit on the school board apparently exists among "desirable" candidates in London, if the evidence is conclusive which was presented by the special committee which reported on Wednesday afternoon to the citizenship committee of Mr. John Lawton, Mrs. W. A. vacancies await to be filled on the board. Of citizens approached with regard to running, only one definite promise has been secured to date, that of the Local Council of Women. Six names will be urged to stand for a second term.

Between nomination and municipal election days, probably on December 1st, it is proposed by the committee to hold a mass meeting at which all the candidates running for municipal honors will be invited to speak and state their platforms. The idea is to give the women of London an opportunity of knowing the candidates and what they stand for.

November 24th has been arranged as the date for the meeting in the Masonic Temple to hear the Conservative candidate, Mr. Frank White, and a representative of the National Liberal-Conservative platform under the auspices of the citizenship committee. Miss Constance Boulton, president of the Toronto Women's Liberal-Conservative Association and a brilliant speaker has been secured to deliver an address on that occasion.

Y. W. C. A. Industrial Federation Holds Fashion Show.

A "Fashion Show" for most practical purposes is the new thing under the sun for the federation of industrial clubs of the London Young Women's Christian Association. Thursday evening is "federation night" at "Lenmore," the King street residence, when representatives of the nine clubs will be present at the supper and for the program to follow. The study of the home, to which the federation is giving attention, will be continued, this time with relation to finances.

What item of expense looms larger for the girl supporting herself than that of clothing? She wants to present a pleasing appearance, because she knows that this not only gives her self-confidence and adds to her self-respect, but is actually an important factor when it comes to securing and holding a

good position. She is a human and "just girl," therefore she is happier when she appears to good advantage. Because she is modern and up-to-the-minute and has heard and read so much on the subject, she realizes that good dressing is largely a matter of suitable dressing, whatever the actual expenditure for clothing.

All these things have been taken into consideration by the Blue Triangle club in presenting the case to Smallman & Ingram and asking the firm to give a fashion show of clothing for girls in business, in the home, and on the street, in connection with the federation night.

This is how it has come about that the girls who attend will see an exhibition of the right things to wear for forenoon and afternoon, and the kind of simple little frocks which prove so becoming for evening.

Owing to the importance of the occasion, the federation is extending an invitation to all girls who are interested to attend.

London Leads.
A very fine compliment has recently been paid London and the industrial department of the Y. W. C. A. of Detroit (a city of a million and a quarter people), wrote to the industrial secretary of the London association, Mrs. Mattie Rose Crawford, asking for the local program of activities of the federation. A letter

has come back from the Detroit executive stating that the educational work being done here is in advance of that in the industrial department of the Y. W. C. A. in the big American city.

The industrial department of the London association, moreover, has the distinction of leading Ontario at the present time in live-wire activities. While the industrial work in larger cities has been marking time to some extent, in London it has forged ahead through the era of industrial depression. A capacity number of clubs for the "Y" accommodation available at the present time has been organized, nine in all, including the "Echo" Club, which made its debut in September. A total membership has been enrolled bordering on five hundred.

In addition to the Technical School classes, the federation is soon to have the Bryn Mawr course in economics, citizenship, etc., through the co-operation of the Western University, the most advanced course for industrial girls' clubs on the American continent.
