Turks Walk Armenians To Death, Doctor Reveals

SUBMITS DIARY OF ATROCITIES TO JOINT ALLIED COMMISSION

Refugees Driven At Point Of Bayonet Back and Forth Along Roads Until They Perish of Starvation and Exhaustion.

Special to London Advertiser.

London, July 13 .- Tragic pages from a doctor's diary tell how the Armenian nation is being literally walked to death. The horrors he describes are continuing.

Dr. Mark H. Ward, relief worker in Armenia since 1915, recently expelled by the Turks, has laid the diary before the joint allied commission for investigation of Turkish atrocities in Asia

Instead of outright murder and massacre, the Turks are driving refugees at the point of bayonets back and forth along roads until they perish of starvation and exhaustion, says Dr. Ward. Ninety per cent of the victims are women and children.


